The revenue officers assert that diamonds worth many millions have been smuggled out in this way in recent years. The smugglers have not been detected, but are supposed to be women who concealed the stones in their clothing.

The crushes of shoppers in the stores were alarming. In some stores the aisles were as crowded as the streets were on the day of the King's funeral.

At one department store 2,000 men pushed their way in between 8 and 8:30 a.m. Like records were attained in other stores.

SIMIAN ANCESTORS

Four to Pick From, Says a Noted German Scholar.

London, June 11.-A man may have gorilla, a chimpanzee, an orangoutang or a gibbon for an ancestor, according to Dr. F. Melchers, a German biologist. In an article on the descent of man, published in the Zeitgeist, Dr. Melchers presents a new theory, the essence of which is that mankind is divided into four great race groups, each of which is descended from one of four race groups

of anthropoid apes. Dr. Melchers ascribes the difficulty nitherto met in solving the missing link problem and filling the gap is the later descent of man to the attempt to trace the human races one parent stock. This, he says, is due to the Old Testament story of a single race surviving and impressing itself on modern evolutionary the

Instead of searching for a single ancestral ape type it is necess y to find four, of which the above- amed are representatives. Basing his argument on a large number of physical peculiarities both of apes and men, Dr. Melchers classifies men and ape in the following relations:

From the gorilla type are descende he race which he calls West Congo Juinea-Sudan-negro, the Bantus and the Zulus, the last two being mixed races, and also the fair haired and red haired northern races, including

From the chimpanzee descend bushmen, Lapps, Berbers, some Turanian races, Iberians and Southern Euro-

The orang-outang is the ancestor o asmanians, Australians, Papuans nd short headed South Germans while all the races known as Mon olians, as well as Malays, Polysians and Siberians, descent from

Dr. Melchers contends that each of these groups has differentiating physical peculiarities which correspond

exactly to the physicial peculiarities of the ape with which he classes it.




