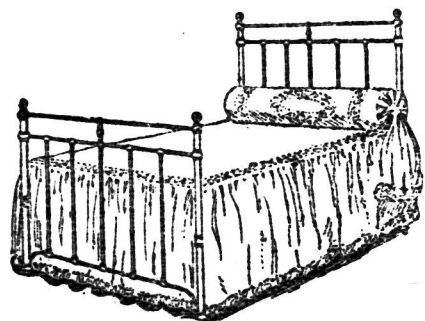

ARE GOING AHEAD SAYS SOTHMAN

Niagara Power Engineer is Quite Optimistic.

Engineer Sothman, of the hydro-electric commission, was in the city last night after a tour of inspection of the northern half of the power line. "We are making rapid progress," he stated. "In fact, we are making too good progress in some places, as the municipalities are not ready. However, I am well pleased."

Mr. Sothman left early today for Niagara Falls, and will inspect the south half on his way.

HEADED TOWARDS RUPTURE.

Madrid, July 28.—El Mundo, discussing the threatened break between the Spanish Government and the Vatican over the refusal of Premier Canalejas to rescind the imperial decree, which permits non-Catholic societies to display the insignia for public worship, says:

"The holy see has no reason to feel offended. It is heading deliberately towards rupture, which will precipitate to the opening of a rapid and energetic anti-clerical campaign."

Weak-Minded Lad Shoots a Girl

Hamilton, July 29.—James Lister Shaw, a 12-year-old lad, visiting at the home of James Sibbald, East avenue, found a loaded revolver in a medicine chest yesterday afternoon, and fired a shot which lodged in the head of a 6-year-old girl, Harriet Phyllis Tabb, killing her instantly. The boy afterwards hid in the cellar. The police, after an investigation, said the boy was weak-minded.

Ontario's Mayors Campaign for Peace

Toronto, July 28.—Mayor Geary today sent the following telegram to mayors of Ontario municipalities and secretaries of boards of trade: "Believing interests of province require settlement of Grand Trunk trainmen's strike, we respectfully suggest to municipalities and boards of trade that they individually and immediately communicate with both parties urging that they recommence negotiations looking to a settlement. This municipality will forward its communication to the parties to reach them this afternoon. Please do likewise. Also send copy of your communication to Minister of Labor."

Rang Up Mr. Hays at Midnight

Montreal, July 28.—An inquisitive Montrealer, who had been interested enough in the strike to obtain a copy of both the company's and strikers' version of the conference with Mr. Hays yesterday, called up the president at 1 o'clock this morning, waking him and bringing him downstairs to the telephone. "I have two reports of the conference," called the inquisitive one, "and I want to know from you which is true?" "If I were you," replied Mr. Hays, "I would believe what the Grand Trunk says."

NEEDHAM'S STORY OF MURDER OF JAKE ENOS

At Inquest, Says That Jackson or Johnson Must Have Done the Shooting.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Chatham, July 29.—The adjourned inquest on the death of Jacob Enos, colored, who was shot on the night of July 18, was resumed at 7:55 last evening. The testimony of Guy Needham, who was slashed with a knife or razor on the night of the shooting was the most important part of the examination. According to Needham's story Enos must have been shot by either Frank Jackson or James Johnson, as these two men were the only persons present at the time of the murder, with the exception of Needham himself. Needham swore that he had found Enos lying on the street and groaning as if in pain. When he went to help him Enos had slashed him with a knife.

"Get him in the head," Needham told them what had happened. They started off towards the place where Enos lay. Needham, following them, came up just in time to see Enos down. He saw Jackson and Johnson there, and one of them said: "It got him in the head." Jackson said to him: "You know nothing about this." According to this, either Jackson or Johnson must have done the shooting. Jackson purchased a 32-calibre revolver with a 32-calibre bullet that was found in Enos' brain. The inquest was again adjourned because some important witnesses did not appear.

a plant capable of supplying 4,500,000 gallons of water?

"It seems to me a serious mistake has been made. I do not care to criticize the motive. The fact remains, however, that in a few months, when the new 18-inch main through the business section, and this, with the increased amount of water which the new machinery and the full complement of seventeen wells will give, will furnish London with ample fire protection, and full supply of water for all purposes for years to come."

"If the city wants a separate high pressure system, that has already been provided for in the Horton street scheme. Provision has been made, so that a separate system can be installed, giving a pressure at the hydrant as high as may be wanted. This plant, with the necessary mains, can be installed for less than the \$200,000, which it is estimated another main to Springfield would cost."

Arbitrary Methods. "I am growing tired of the arbitrary manner in which the underwriters, a body which is not even incorporated, are riding rough-shod over the people. I have already taken this matter up with Premier Whitney, and when the improvements which London is making are completed, I shall again go into the question with Sir James. If that something is done to end the tyranny of the insurance people, I believe the Ontario Legislature will pass legislation which will give the Government power to interfere with the matter of rates in the different municipalities. Our Mr. Hunter has been looking into the question, and we expect a valuable report from him on the subject shortly."

LABOR MINISTER GOES TO MONTREAL

Ottawa, July 29.—Hon. Mackenzie King went to Montreal yesterday afternoon at the request, it is understood, of one of the parties concerned in the Grand Trunk strike. He made no statement before leaving.

RAILWAY LABORERS ONLY.

London, July 29.—In the Commons yesterday Kinloch Cooke inquired as to what effect the admission of railway laborers into Canada had on the regulation prohibiting assisted emigrants, other than agriculturists. Col. Seeley replied that he thought the order did not apply to assisted emigrants.

MEN WILL FORCE FIGHT

those organizations answer that for themselves," Mr. Murdoch replied.

That the strike is now undoubtedly a fight to a bitter finish, Mr. Murdoch has no doubt, and as a matter of fact he, this morning, dispatched telegrams to his sub-leutenants on all the portions of the road, warning them that there was little or no hope for a settlement in view of the fact that yesterday's conferences between the heads of the striking orders and Mr. Hays, the G. T. R. president, resulted fruitlessly. Mr. Murdoch was rather reticent about revealing these telegrams, saying they would be of no interest. But he said they were to the effect given, that the strike had very little hopes of amicable settlement and that the men might as well prepare themselves for a finish fight.

"There is absolutely no truth in the report that we were ready to call off the strike on terms which we refused to accept before the walkout took place," Mr. Murdoch said this morning.

"Our men called on Mr. Hays yesterday to discuss the matter with him and to see whether the attitude of both sides was thoroughly understood. Mr. Hays was firm in saying that he would not accept arbitration, but that's all a part of his bluff, for he must know quite well that if this strike continued it is bound to ruin the property. Mr. Hays is either a very fine bluffer or a fool—and he is not a fool."

The Engineers. Mr. Cameron, who is the chairman of the engineers on the Grand Trunk Railway, said that the engineers were not at all affected by the strike, nor were they looking for any trouble. The company does not ask the men to do any work which will infringe upon the striking trainmen, the engineers will remain on the job, and thus far they have not been requested to do anything outside of their regular work.

"Everything is serene among the engineers," said Mr. Cameron, "and we're not looking for any trouble." According to the Grand Trunk officials, there are today unmistakable signs of a disposition on the part of the conductors who obeyed reluctantly the order to strike, breaking away from the striking trainmen, who are opposed to compromise and return to work on the advance of 18 per cent and the postponement of standardization.
