Sinclair and Milson were recommended to attend college, and Kyle Simpson to attend medical college in the city. Gordon Kaiser and Edward Matthews were recommended to continue at college.

Capt. Coles, who has been quartermaster, takes command of E. Company, from which Capt. Gregory resigned.

The announcement will be made shortly of the appointment of Capt. Philip Pocock as paymaster of the regiment.

ROBBED CHURCH BOX SAYS HE WAS ASLEEP

Pastor Caught Thief Looking by an Ingenious Device.

Halifax, May 19.—Recently the collection box in the Methodist Church at Milltown, N. S., had been repeatedly robbed. It was determined to catch the robber, and the church trustees set an automatic alarm box on the box connected with Pastor Cartwright's house.

Monday morning, at 3 o'clock, the clergyman was awakened by an alarm, and hurrying to the church he found the man emptying the box. Securely, he captured the culprit, who proved to be one of the officials, aged 75.

The man has been lodged in jail and it is understood he will plead sleep-walking as an excuse for his offence.

SPOULE MAY RETIRE

Early Change Expected in Grand Mastership of Orange Order.

Toronto, May 19.—The retirement of Dr. T. S. Sproule, M. P., as grand master and sovereign of the M. W. Grand Orange Lodge of British America, is again rumored. Grand lodge meets at Brantford next Wednesday, and the reported change is a topic of discussion in the grand lodge circles. Should Dr. Sproule decide to vacate the chair, which he has held since the death of the last grand master, Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, M. P., he will be succeeded by his deputy, Lieut.-Col. J. H. Scott, K. C., of Walkerton. Col. Sam Hughes, M. P., and E. T. Essery, K. C., past grand master of Ontario, are also mentioned as possible successors to the deputy chair.

At this session of grand lodge will be discussed the proposal of R. W. Bro. A. W. Wright, to limit the term of a grand lodge officer to three years, a practice generally followed in the provincial grand lodges.

DOYLE ON THE OATH

Noted Author Makes Strong Plea to Have It Amended.

London, May 19.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle is a strong champion of striking from the accession declaration the phrases offensive to Catholics. "Is it not shocking," he says, "that while the Roman Catholic chapel is crowded with devotees, still draped in black for the dead monarch, his successor should be compelled by law to insult the most intimate convictions of these same mourners? And is it not most narrow, foolish policy, unworthy of this tolerant age, that the young King be forced to offend the feelings of great numbers of Irishmen, Canadians, and other subjects."

Doyle is a member of the Catholic Church, the great majority of broad-minded thinkers of any or no denomination of this country are of the opinion that the outcry of fanatics should be disregarded, and all should receive the same courteous and respectful treatment. So long as their adherents are members of a common empire, to bring these medieval rancors to an end would indeed be an auspicious omen of a new era.

The opponents of the Catholic Church in the meantime are active in protesting against any alteration of the accession declaration.

King George has placed the responsibility for its amendment on the shoulders of the Government, and it will introduce a bill without delay. But there is likely to be a stormy time, and the King's personality is certain to be involved when the discussion becomes heated.

A KNOTTY KNOT.

Port Huron, Mich., May 18.—William Micks appeared today before the county clerk and took out a license to wed Ella Smith. Micks and Miss Smith were married before, but later it developed that the marriage was illegal because Micks had not gone through the formality of securing a divorce from his first wife. Later he secured this divorce, and the regular ceremony, and then, to make everything sure, he had his marriage with Ella Smith declared void. Then the second ceremony, with everything proper and legal, came today.

BROKE MEAT ACT.

Toronto, May 18.—Clifford Payne, a butcher, was fined \$100 and costs of 20 days in jail by Magistrate Kingsford this morning for retailing meat contrary to the meat and canned meat and pure food act. The information was laid by Dominion Constable Cowan.

Payne had an arrangement with a local abattoir for the supply of a certain class of meat. The meat was stamped "Canada Approved," and under the Government regulation society in 1890.
