TREMENDOUS WASTE

Expert Says American Railways Could Save \$300,000,000 a Year.

Washington, Nov. 23.—A saving of \$300,000,000 annually in railroad operating expenses in this country might be accomplished by the adoption of scientific methods of management, according to Harrington Emerson, a mechanical engineer expert of New York City, who testified before the interstate commerce commission today. This estimate, which is identical with the amount named by Senator Aldrich as a possible economy in the administration of the Federal Government on business principles, was made during the hearing of the proposed freight rate advances in official classification territory.

The day's sessions of the commission consisted mostly of discussion of scientific management by expert witnesses. This line of testimony was closed late in the afternoon when the commission adjourned until Friday.

ALLEGED SWINDLER

Tried to Shoot Himself When Captured by Police.

Windsor, Nov. 23.—Hume H. West, ex-Detroit, who attempted to shoot himself when arrested in Baltimore, Md., last Saturday when he was discovered by the police after a four years' chase, is thought to have obtained various sums of money from Canadian banks by false means. In 1906, shortly after he "jumped" a bail bond in Detroit.

It is believed West operated in several cities and towns along the Canadian border under an assumed name. He is alleged to have procured about \$3000 through a certified check switching scheme from a bank in Sarnia, Ont., also about \$4000 by the same means from the "Traders" and Dominion Banks of Windsor.

Messrs. Stone and Mair, managers of the Dominion and Traders' Banks, respectively, deny the receipt of the operations of such a man as West, four years ago.

Former Provincial Detective Campaign, of Windsor, declares he was assigned the duty of locating West after his operations in Windsor under directions from the provincial police department. His quest was unsuccessful.

"I still retain possession of photographs of the man who swindled two banks in Windsor," declared Campaign, "and I am positive West was the original of them."

WOMEN'S CANADIAN CLUB PLAN WINTER'S WORK

Number of Prominent Speakers Will Be Heard and Lectures on Live Topics Given.

The London Women's Canadian Club held a meeting yesterday at which they mapped out plans for the coming winter. It was decided to bring a number of prominent speakers to the city to address the club, and lectures will be held on the first Friday of every month in the Normal School. The secretary was instructed to arrange dates with a number of well-known lecturers.

Addresses on the education and rearing of children, the prevention of disease, and questions touching on civic and public welfare, will be features of the club's winter programme.

AMBULANCE WORK TO BE EXTENDED

The St. John Association Planning to Branch Out Throughout Canada.

Toronto, Nov. 24.—The St. John Ambulance Association, which has been doing such commendable work in all parts of the empire, is now planning to branch out and establish the institution throughout Canada. For this purpose a meeting will be held in Toronto in December at the instance of the association headquarters in Ottawa. Delegates will be present from all over Canada to make preparations for the establishment of centres throughout the Dominion.

The work of the St. John Ambulance Association is to teach home hygiene, sanitation, and first aid to the injured. This work is particularly valuable in foundries, factories, on railroads, and anywhere that accidents of a serious nature are likely to happen, when it is necessary for aid to be rendered before a surgeon can be summoned to save life.

The work has been well taken up in Toronto. Several of the larger employers of labor have had their men instructed, the Technical School, and the Evangelia settlement have classes of instruction, and no man can become a member of the police force here until he has been instructed on the administering of first aid and has passed a rigorous examination on the subject. The G. T. R. and C. P. R. railroads have taken the matter up and it has met with great favor with them. The instructions are given to the pupils by expert medical men engaged by the association.

Just at present there are only branches in eight towns in Ontario, and the work has not been taken up generally throughout the Dominion. It is, therefore, planned to establish provincial councils, and then have each of these establish centres throughout the provinces, from which the work can be controlled. It is a stupendous task, but the wonderful work which the organization has been doing in other parts of the empire is an example of what the organization can do.

An organizer will also be employed to travel about and assist in establishing the different branches.

His Excellency, the Governor-General, has expressed his approval of the work, and his excellency will probably be present at the meeting in December, as will His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, under whose patronage the institution is conducted in Ontario.

A BIG PROMOTION FOR MR. D. CROMBIE

Former Londoner Made Assistant to First Vice-President of G. T. R.

A Montreal dispatch announces that Mr. David Crombie, formerly master of transportation on the G. T. R. here, has been promoted to be assistant to First Vice-President Fitzhugh. Mr. Crombie left London to become assistant passenger manager, which position he has held for some time. Before coming to London he was in business in Chatham, and prior to that was superintendent of the Pere Marquette car service, with headquarters in Detroit.

Mr. James Crombie, at present master of transportation here, and formerly chief dispatcher, is a brother.

WHAT PROMOTERS ASK OF THE CITY

Lay Claim For Bond Guarantee Before the Finance Committee.

SEEK AN ENTRANCE

Would Be Willing to Accept That Instead of the Guarantee—Matter Laid Over.

At a special meeting of the finance committee of the city council held yesterday afternoon, Mr. D. A. Stewart and Mr. A. E. Welch, on behalf of the London and Northwestern Railway and the North Midland Railway, respectively, laid their case before the committee, and asked that the council submit a bylaw to the ratepayers, in January to guarantee a certain portion of their bonds. As there was no quorum the matter will stand over for a day or two, when another meeting will be held to finally dispose of the matter. It is quite likely that the bylaw will be submitted.

Mr. D. A. Stewart, speaking for the London and Northwestern, said he desired the city to guarantee \$150,000 worth of bonds. The total cost of construction would be \$18,000 a mile, or \$1,224,000 for the 68 miles of road. This included equipment. It was his intention to have the municipalities guarantee \$250,000 of this issue, and London had been apportioned \$150,000. The city would be placed on a level with other bond holders. Mr. Stewart thought his request reasonable. He presented plans of his road, and a detailed statement of the probable cost.

Some discussion took place as to the advisability of issuing half the bonds as first mortgage securities, and curing the balance on second mortgage bonds, or preferred stock. To this Mr. Stewart offered some objection, saying that it would be impossible to issue second mortgage bonds, and preferred stock, and obtain a good price.

The North Midland.

Mr. A. E. Welch followed, with an explanation of his proposition. The North Midland would run through Lucan, St. Marys, Stratford and further north to Brussels. It would tap a country which at the present time yielded little business for the city of London. It would develop a new line, and greatly benefit the terminal points. His proposition would cost \$2,500,000 to complete, and he was asking the various municipalities to guarantee \$425,000. The line would be very small sum, and he thought that there would be very little trouble in getting the people to grant it. As in the case of the London and Northwestern, the city would have a good chance with all the other bond holders. If the proposition was not a success, the city would stand pro rata the losses with the other bond holders.

"I do not think of doing the proper thing," said Mr. Welch. "The possibilities of development given by such a road are inestimable, and every municipality along the road will benefit."

Mr. Stewart further explained that his road would distribute and sell Niagara power. The farmers have been asked to give a price in quantities from 1,000 to 10,000 horsepower. Many municipalities had asked if they could get power from the hydro-electric, and it was proposed to sell the energy alone considered. The road itself would consume 1,000 or perhaps 2,000 horsepower.

"How would it be if the council got you an entrance into the city, rather than guarantee the bonds?" asked Ald. Eckert.

"That would suit me first rate," said Mr. Stewart. "That would solve one problem."

"I would be satisfied with that," declared Mr. Welch.

"That opens another problem which we had better not interfere with," said Mayor Beattie. "The London street railway would have to be considered and there would arise complications very difficult of solution."

After a short discussion it was decided to allow the matter to stand until a full meeting of the committee was held.

Those present were Ald. Richter, chairman, Ald. Eckert, Mayor Beattie, D. A. Stewart and J. D. Bromberg, representing the London and Northwestern, and A. E. Welch, T. H. Luscombe, and William Scarlett, representing the North Midland, City Solicitor Meredith and Secretary Baker.

POTATO CROP SHORT FROM BAD WEATHER

Large Quantities Worthless, and Price Is Likely to Advance.

The cold weather and the snow is likely to cause a shortage in the potato crop. The farmers have been extra busy this fall and as a consequence a large portion of the crop is still in the ground. Many decided to wait for better weather, but the heavy fall of snow and the indications that it will last, have upset all plans and the chances are that potatoes near the surface will be frozen. One farmer stated that he had 200 bushels to dig, but found that nearly all of them were worthless. Many others have been caught in the same manner, and some have lost a good many hundred bushels. This means quite a financial loss to the growers, and it is not improbable that it will cause the price of potatoes to advance.

SEIZED SCHOOLSITE FOR TEACHER'S SALARY

Teacher Got a Judgment Against School Trustees, and It Was Not Paid.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 23.—The school building with its contents and the site in a York County school district has been seized to satisfy the claim of a teacher for unpaid salary. The seizure was made by Deputy Sheriff Winter on behalf of W. H. Anderson, a licensed teacher, who got a judgment in the county court against the school trustees of district No. 7½ in the parish of Bright, for unpaid salary. Since Mr. Anderson was the teacher in the district another teacher, Miss Eliza Yerxa, brought suit against the trustees for her salary, gaining a judgment in the county court, but because she had no teacher's license the supreme court held that her contract with the trustees was invalid.
