WHY DIDN'T CITY ADVERTISE NEW LAWS?

Auto Owners in Ignorance of Regulations Until Hauled Into Court.

Some sharp criticisms were made of the city's traffic bylaw in police court Tuesday. An attack was directed at the section of the bylaw which relates to automobiles and their time allowance for standing at a curb unattended. A local auto owner was summoned for leaving his car standing on King street last Tuesday for two hours and fifty-five minutes, according to P. C. Holden's official timepiece. Mr. Jared Vining appeared for the owner, and he and the magistrate engaged in a discussion on the hardships of the traffic bylaw.

Mr. Vining contended that the bylaw was calculated to mislead the public, and that it was particularly hard on auto-owners. He claimed that the city council had not given proper notice of the bylaws which had been forced on the public.

"Both the traffic bylaws were fearfully and wonderfully made," said Mr. Vining.

"I do not think the city solicitor drew them up," the magistrate replied.

"However, I am only here to see that they are carried out, and not to criticize them," continued his worship in a way that reminded one of Marc Antony's funeral oration. "There are hardships, I can see that," he added.

"Yes, the public were deceived, and they are laboring under a delusion at present," was Mr. Vining's comment.

"The papers will dispel that idea this evening," was the magistrate's parting shot, and then Mr. Vining's client handed over the \$3, which his honor deemed was necessary to settle the case.

INTEND TO LECTURE THE CITY FATHERS

East End Progressives Hot Over the Treatment in Matter of Market.

The East End Progressives are highly indignant over the recent action of the city council in again shelving their market scheme. They say that they have been made the laughing stock of the council. They are greatly surprised at the willingness of Pottersburg and Ealing to be annexed, as they say that the treatment which will be handed to these villages will be even worse than that accorded to the East End, owing to the distance from the centre of the city.

"What is the next step the Progressives are going to take?" The Advertiser asked President Wm. Wakefield.

"Well, we are going to have a meeting of the society next week, when we will draw up a petition of rights and incidentally tell the city fathers just what we think of them," answered Mr. Wakefield. "We have not dropped our pet scheme by any means, and intend to make it go yet. What surprises me is why Pottersburg, Ealing and other suburbs desire to join with the city. We had collected nearly \$700 and the market site was to be turned over free to the city without any encumbrance whatever. What will be the treatment of Pottersburg and Ealing after annexation I would not care to predict."

WATERWORKS PLANS MUST BE APPROVED

Work on New System Cannot Stand Without Provincial Board's Sanction.

Sarnia, Sept. 11. — Dr. McCullough, chairman of the provincial board of health, has written to the mayor of Sarnia stating that the bylaw to be submitted to the people for the removal of the waterworks to Point Edward cannot be voted upon until the plans and specifications have been submitted to the provincial board of health and approved by them.

The board has received nothing but a general report from the engineer, which is not considered sufficient.

Would Invalidate Bylaw.
If the request is not complied with, the bylaw would be invalidated.

Dr. McCullough concludes by saying: "I also note that on the 25th of last month a sample of water from your intake pipe showed contamination with colon bacillus. Let me emphasize the importance under these conditions of keeping the chlorination plant at work without cessation, or in event of accident to that, immediate notification to the people to boil the water before using it."

The new chain works will erect a cement building on a piece of land at the south end of Vidal street, adjoining the Grand Trunk property.
