**FIRE IN PLANT OF HEARST'S JOURNAL**

Editorial and Mechanical Staffs of American Smoked Out.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, April 18.—The editorial and mechanical staffs of the New York American were forced to flee from their building, near Brooklyn Bridge terminal, at press time early today by a devastating fire. The blaze originated in the engine room from an explosion, and ate its way rapidly around the pressroom, while dense clouds of smoke poured up the elevator shafts, making the escape of more than a hundred workers on the upper floors seem perilous, but all got out safely. The pressroom was so badly damaged that it was necessary to print the late editions from the World plant. The loss is less than \$50,000. Two firemen were badly injured in fighting the flames.

JOHN WAYMAN SUICIDES

MRS. E. WATTERWORTH

DIED VERY SUDDENLY

Had Resided in Ridgeway for the Past Forty-six Years.

Ridgeway, April 18.—Mrs. Esther Watterworth, 81, of the late David Watterworth, died at her home here yesterday. Her death was quite unexpected, and came as a great shock to the family and friends. Her maiden name was McCally, and she was born in Harwich in 1835. After teaching school for a number of years, she married the late David Watterworth in 1865, and had resided in Ridgeway ever since. All her life Mrs. Watterworth was a member of the Baptist Church, taking an active part in its various activities. She leaves two sons and four daughters: William and John, of Ridgeway; Mrs. Carlisle Hall, Toronto; Mrs. C. B. Brown, Miss Grace and Miss Blanche, at home. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and interment will be made in Greenwood Cemetery.

BLAZE AT HARRISTON

Part of Ice Plant Wiped Out in Early Morning Fire.

ASSAULTERS OF GIRLS

GIVEN LONG TERMS

Two Woodstock Men Were Sent to Penitentiary for Two Years.

Woodstock, April 18.—Two years in Kingston at hard labor was the sentence handed out by Magistrate Ball this morning to Frederick Skillings, of Blenheim Township, who was convicted on his own admission of assault on a neighbor's daughter with criminal intent. Skillings' aged father and mother, in court to hear sentence, broke down when they heard it.

Charles Cutmore, of this city, was convicted of a serious offence against a young West Oxford girl, who is now in trouble. He also was sent to Kingston for two years.

FRENCH CANADIAN IN CABINET OF ROBLIN

First Time in Twenty-Three Years That One Has Held Portfolio.

Winnipeg, April 18.—The Winnipeg Telegram says this morning:

Joseph Bernier, M. P. for St. Boniface, has been asked to take the portfolio of provincial secretary in the Government of Sir Rodmond Roblin, and has accepted. Bernier will be sworn into the new office some time during the early part of next week.

With the addition of the member for St. Boniface, the number of cabinet ministers will be increased to seven.

When Mr. Bernier assumes his new duties it will be the first time in 23 years that a French-Canadian has assumed office in the local Government. In 1890, Mr. Justice Prendergast, who was then a cabinet minister in the Government of the late Hon. Thomas Greenway, resigned his portfolio over the school question, and up to the present no French members could be induced to accept cabinet positions, owing to the complex nature of this question.

Mr. Bernier has always been a staunch supporter of Premier Roblin, both in and out of the House, and a strong advocate of the progressive policies of the present Government.

FINDS RICH WRECK.

Tacoma, Wash., April 18.—The cannery schooner Sadie F. Call, lost at sea 18 years ago, has been called back from the "Port of Missing Ships." Walter McCary, of this city, a submarine diver, "stumbled" upon the vessel in 60 feet of water near Chignik Lagoon, Alaska, recently, and is preparing to take out of the wreck nearly \$50,000 in bullion with which she is laden. He is on his way back to Alaska today to salvage the cargo of the Call.

Scraping away the weeds and brambles, the diver uncovered the vessel's name board. Investigation showed the schooner had cleared from San Francisco for the canneries 18 years ago, and foundered off the Alaskan coast at a point far from her present resting place. McCary reached an agreement with the owners and consignees under which he will get 50 per cent of the salvage.
