Germany Comes Third in **Commercial Relations** With America.

Washington, Oct. 11 .- Canadian Press .- Canada tops the list of countries in trade with the United States during August, statistics issued to-dey by the department of trade and merce disclose.

The United States sold more goods to Canada than to any other country, and also bought more goods from the Dominion during the month Canada ordinarily is second only to Great Britain in the volume of trade with this country. During August, however, both exports to and imports from the Dominion were a mil-Non dollars above those of the old country. The figures were: Canada - Exports, \$56,000,000 against \$68,000,000 in August, 1921.

DRISONERS at the county jail have been fed at an average cost of 14.8 cents a day, during the year ending Sept. 30, according to Governor Byron Dawson's report for

that period. During one quarter the average cost was in the neighborhood of 19 cents, but since the new contracts with provision merchants have become effective the prices of many of the necessities of life have been
