

URGES GREATER UNITY BETWEEN TWO PROVINCES

Reverend Father Declares Quebec and Ontario Should Get Together.

ARE THE OLDEST
States They Are Part of the Tradition of Canada.

Quebec, March 16. — A reverend Father, whom The Advertiser met on the train coming to Quebec, put the cause for unity between the two provinces more forcibly.

"Quebec and Ontario," he said, "are the two oldest provinces. They have been here the longest. They have been the land as those who have come here lately cannot. They are part of the tradition of Canada. Therefore, they should get together to the new-comers."

Sentiment in Quebec city is unanimously in favor of Lieutenant-Governor Cockfield's idea for a luncheon, when prominent men of both provinces will be present. They know many Ontario men by name, by reputation, and they welcome the opportunity to know these men personally.

Taschereau To Attend.
Premier Taschereau will attend the luncheon at the Government House in Toronto on Saturday. He leaves Friday afternoon for Toronto in a special car. In the number of Quebec people will accompany him. Hon. M. Nioche, provincial treasurer, is already in Sherbrooke, and will leave from there to attend the luncheon. Others in the car will be Judge Dorion, who is in Montreal, M. Perdon, representing Laval University, and B. A. Benoit, the premier's secretary.

Sir George Garneau was expected as a guest, but is ill and unable to come. A number of others from Quebec were hoping to attend, but on account of sickness or press of business will be unable to be present.

Gouin To Speak.

Speakers who will represent Quebec in Toronto will be Premier Taschereau, Sir Lomer Gouin, and Ferdinand Roy, K.C. of Quebec. It is hoped here that there will be much ultimate good from the luncheon, such as Saturday's luncheon. Business and professional men will have an opportunity to become acquainted in a social way, and to realize each others good qualities in a manner impossible at conventions.

One prominent French-Canadian in speaking to The Advertiser gave the keynote of this gathering, saying: "It is not so damn serious (if you will pardon me using that term) as the Bonnet Entente of 1917. For that reason I think it will succeed better. It will be a pleasure rather than a business." This is the idea of the Quebec men who are going to Toronto for March 17.

They are going for a pleasant social visit to get acquainted.

Guide officers and commissioners from as far north as Muskoka and east as Kingston are attending the gathering in session in Crown Hall, which opened at 2 o'clock in Crown Hall.

Mrs. Christopher Lord, Muskoka commissioner, left her home in Bala buried deep in snow, and was surprised to find the city still open from Toronto to the city almost free from snow.

The delegates on their arrival were met at the station by Mrs. Allan McLean, deputy commissioner, who is acting commissioner in the absence of the commissioner, Mrs. E. B. Smith. Mrs. E. B. She referred with gratification to the rapid growth of the movement, and the keen interest which is being taken in Guide work throughout the province. Fifty-three new companies had been formed during the past year, making a total recorded of 126 Guide companies, 45 Brownie packs, and 8 Ranger companies, 1 Cadet company, nearly 5,000 girls in all, as compared with 3,749 last year.

The recognition accorded by the provincial government in the past year has been most encouraging for the executive, this taking the tangible form of a grant of \$5,000.
