14 cupful Borden's milk, diluted with 14 cupful cold water.

14 cupful vegetable cooking oil.

2-3 cupful sugar. teaspoonful salt.

1½ teaspoonfuls baking powder. 1½ cupfuls sifted flour. ½ teaspoonful vanilla.

1/2 tèaspoonful lemon extract. Beat the egg light and cream it with the sugar, salt, and flavoring. Combine the milk, diluted, with the cooking oil. Sift together the dry ingredients and add them alternately to the first mixture with the milk. Associated Press Despatch. London, June 19 .- Publication of the exchange of proposals between Germany and the allied powers for Good, Children's Aid a pact of security, has made it clear that the negotiations which have already covered more than four months without even a preliminary agreement, are likely to be greatly protracted. # FINDS POPPY DAY FROM 12 TO ONE A MONTH IS COMMERCIALIZED

Special Committee Appointed by Senate Condemns Exclusive Sale.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, June 18.—The special committee appointed by the senate to investigate the administration of the anteen fund and the disablement fund finds in a report presented in the upper house that the sale of popples on Armistice Day has been com-mercialized and that in 1922, 1923 and 1924 the dominion command, Great War Veterans' Association, profited by its transaction in the purchase and sale of popples in the sum of \$25,148.15.

The report outlines procedure in the purchase of poppies from the de-partment of soldiers' civil re-establishment and their sale. It says that tion expenses, \$15,850.48; net profits, \$9,462.72.

The committee recommends that: 1—No exclusive privilege for the sale of poppies manufactured under the auspices of the department of Paper race, Mrs. Endall; clothes-peg Gammage, soldiers' civil re-restablisment be per-mitted, but that all such poppies be made available at prices and upon terms equal to all.

2—Care must be taken in the disposal of these popples to see that no middleman's profits accrue. 3—That the commercialization of the sale of these poppies be eliminat-ed, and to that end the provincial units of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment be utilized for the distribution of poppies within the


