One-Egg Cake.	1½ teaspoonful lemon extract.
¾ cupful Borden's milk, diluted with ¼ cupful cold water.	Beat the egg light and cream it with the sugar, salt, and flavoring.

2-3 cupful sugar.	Beat thoroughly, turn into a lined, medium-sized pan and sprinkle nut meats, chopped raisins or coconut over the top. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes.

LONG TIME TAKEN IN SECURITY WORK

Negotiations Between Britain, France and Germany Have Been Protracted.

Associated Press Despatch. London, June 19.—Publication of the exchange of proposals between Germany and the allied powers for a pact of security, has made it clear that the negotiations which have already covered more than four months without even a preliminary agreement, are likely to be greatly protracted. The German proposals were that her western frontiers be guaranteed against aggression, leaving her eastern borders open to possible revision by peaceful means. The French note giving the allied view is in effect only an invitation for Germany to elaborate proposals in greater detail.

CHILD ADOPTIONS DROP FROM 12 TO ONE A MONTH

Growing Indifference to Appeal of Homeless Puzzles W. E. Kelly.

TWO IN TWO MONTHS
Majority of Wards Make Good, Children's Aid Official Declares.

"Why has the public become indifferent to the appeal of the homeless child?" is the question propounded by W. E. Kelly of the local children's aid society, in view of the unusual situation created by the fact that there have been practically no applications for the adoption of wards of the society for the past two months.

Mr. Kelly does not attempt to answer the question, in fact, he is as puzzled as anybody to know the reason for the falling off in applications. He merely points to the facts, which are that during May only one application for a child was received by his office, and only one so far this month. This is most unusual, as the average runs from ten to twelve a month, and has on occasions gone as high as twenty.

"It would be interesting to know the real reason why people are apparently no longer anxious to give a homeless child a chance to make good in life," said Mr. Kelly. "After all it is not our appeal. It is the appeal of the children themselves, who say 'Here we are, we are healthy and strong, we have had as good a start in life as anybody, will nobody come forward and give us a chance to carry on?'"

Adoption of such children, Mr. Kelly states, proves entirely satisfactory in the majority of cases. He cited an instance of a former ward of the society who had a visit to his office this morning after an absence of twenty-seven years. This young man was adopted by a local family when he was one year of age and he stayed with them until his education was completed. He is now 28, enjoys good health and is prospering. He dropped in to see Mr. Kelly to assure him that he is still interested in the organization through which he got his chance in life.

There are a number of fine children for adoption at the shelter at the present time, including a pair of twin boys, and Mr. Kelly is hopeful of finding homes for a number of these children in the near future.

LONDON LABOR PLANS TAG DAY FOR STRIKERS

Funds To Aid Miners Will Be Sought in Drive Next Saturday.

A tag day in aid of the striking Nova Scotia miners and their families will be held in London a week from tomorrow under the joint auspices of the trades and labor council and the women's labor party. J. F. Thompson, secretary of the council, announced this morning that permission for the drive had been obtained from the mayor and the chief of police. Mrs. Floyd Wells, president of the women's party here, and R. H. Hessel of the trades council, will meet tomorrow to design the tags and to organize the drive.

Plans for London unions to relieve the distress among the 65,000 affected by the strike were laid on Wednesday night after W. Hayes, miners' executive, had told a graphic story of conditions in the Maritimes. Women's party members also heard the address and a committee was immediately formed to co-operate with the council. The committee is composed of Mrs. Floyd Wells, chairman, Mrs. Fred White, Mrs. Ager, and Mrs. A. Small.

A eulchre has already been arranged for next Tuesday night in the east end town hall, the proceeds of which will go into the general relief fund. A special relief dance is also planned for the women's party picnic to be held at Springbank on July 7.

FINDS POPPY DAY IS COMMERCIALIZED

Special Committee Appointed by Senate Condemns Exclusive Sale.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, June 18.—The special committee appointed by the senate to investigate the administration of the canteen fund and the disablement fund finds in a report presented in the upper house that the sale of poppies on Armistice Day has been commercialized and that in 1922, 1923 and 1924 the dominion command, Great War Veterans' Association, profited by its transaction in the purchase and sale of poppies in the sum of \$25,148.15.

The report outlines procedure in the purchase of poppies from the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment and their sale. It says that in a statement of receipts and expenditures submitted to the committee by the dominion command of the Great War Veterans' Association its operations in the sale of poppies for the three years, 1922, 1923, 1924, total sales, \$105,679.56; cost, \$80,366.36; gross profits, \$25,313.20; administration expenses, \$15,850.48; net profits, \$9,462.72.

The committee recommends that: 1.—No exclusive privilege for the sale of poppies manufactured under the auspices of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment be permitted, but that all such poppies be made available at prices and upon terms equal to all.

2.—Care must be taken in the disposal of these poppies to see that no middleman's profits accrue.

3.—That the commercialization of the sale of the poppies be eliminated, and to that end the provincial units of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment be utilized for the distribution of poppies within the several provinces.
