

CANADA'S TRADE SHOWS GAIN

The Year Just Closed Shows Gain of Fourteen Millions Over Previous Year.

OTTAWA, December 31.—Trade figures for the Dominion for the year which closes today, when fully available, will show a total trade of approximately \$2,350,000,000.

For the eleven months of the calendar year, for which definite statistics are now available, the total trade was well over the two billion dollar mark. During that period merchandise was exported to the value of \$1,251,094,540 as compared with \$1,300,761,035 for the same months in 1918. Total imports of merchandise to November 30, 1919, was to the value of \$929,077,014 as against \$898,211,913 for the eleven corresponding months in the previous year.

Notable goods brought into Canada for the period were to the value of \$658,907,143, as against \$508,209,512 for the corresponding period in 1918, while in 1919 free goods worth \$324,169,871 crossed Canadian borders, as compared with \$390,008,401 in 1918.

MUST HAVE MORE REVENUE

Wages Advance on Canadian Railways Amounts to \$82,000,000 a Year.

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—It is stated that the advance in railway wages caused by the application of the McAdoo award to Canada had amounted to an increased expenditure by the Canadian railways of about \$82,000,000 yearly. Advance in freight and passenger rates had increased by about \$40,000,000. The problem of meeting this deficit will come before the railway board sooner or later, it was said, in a demand for further adjustment of rates to meet costs.

BRITISH COLUMN SMASHES STAND

Revolting Indian Tribes Beaten After Battle Lasting Two Days.

LONDON.—Despatches received here from British India under date of December 18 and December 20 show that there has been heavy fighting between the British expeditionary forces and the revolting tribesmen. Severe losses were inflicted on the rebels, although the British apparently had difficulty in defeating them.

A despatch from Mandannakach, dated December 18, says the British column, fighting against 2,000 Mahsuds and another force composed of Waziri and Mahsuds, who occupied the hills westward of Jandola, captured the Sarkai Ridge, driving the tribesmen from their positions, upon which the British later pitched their camp. Airplanes followed the enemy, harassing them and causing numbers of casualties. In the encounter the British losses are described as having been light.

A further despatch, dated December 20, shows that on December 19 the tribesmen counter attacked and the British were compelled to retire owing to heavy casualties from Sand Bag Hill, which they previously had taken after a stubborn resistance lasting several hours. Sand Bag Hill and the adjacent ridges form a strategic position essential to the safety of the British columns in their further progress.

The battle was continued on December 20, and the British in two hours recaptured the positions they were forced to abandon the previous day. The enemy casualties are reported to have been heavy.

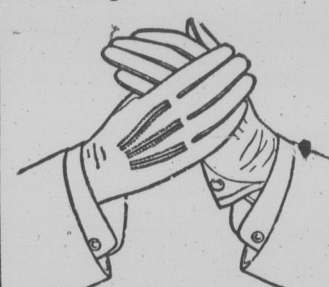
