BURNS LAID TO REST

(From the Gloucester Northern Light) The death of His Worship P. J. Burns, Mayor of Bathurst, which occurred on Tuesday of last week has cast a deep gloom over the whole town. While the deceased had been confined to his home for the past month, and it was known that his condition was at times very serious, yet his sudden taking off just when reports from his sick-room were beginning to be very hopeful, came as a shock to our citizens.

The deceased was born in Thomastown, Tipperary, Ireland in July 1845. The family left the "old sod" and settled in Chatham when the late Mr. Rurns was still a boy, and from here the future mayor moved to Bathurst in the year 1868. At this time he was employed with his brother, the late Senator Kennedy F. Burns, in the conduct of a mercantile establishment for a firm in Chatham, and in those days no one could have predicted that these two brothers, so unlike in many ways, would in the years following take so large a part in the development of this part of the country.
