## ANSWERED THE PATRONS.

MESSRS. FOSTER AND MONTAGUE AT BEAVERTON.

Each Addressed Two Meetings Yesterday— The Minister of Finance Paid Special Attention to Patron Complaints -Lockie Wilson Was There and Frank Pedley Represented the Liberal Candidate.

Beaverton, Dec. 9.-Hon. George E. Foster and Hon Dr. Montague had a busy day in North Ontario. In the afternion Mr. Foster addressed a meeting at Sunderland, while Dr. Montague spoke at Scott. Both had very

uccessful meetings.
Hon. Mr. Foster spoke for two hours at Sunderland and devoted nearly all the time to dealing with certain criticisms of the Government indulged in by the Patron leaders and speakers. At Beaverton to-night, Mr. Foster and Dr. Montague joined forces. Mr. J. Lockie Wilson appeared as the representative of the Patron candidate, while Frank Pedley of Toronto, wielded the cudgels on behalf of Mr. Gillespie, the Liberal.

The Meeting Opened.

Both of these gentlemen were given the opportunity of opening the meeting and both modestly declined. Mr. Foster, therefore, in order that the meeting might proceed, took the initiative

tive.

At the outset he stated clearly that he did not hope to convert any Grits that might be in the meeting and he, therefore, decided to confine his appeal to a class of electors who were once Liberal-Conservatives, but were now known by the name of Patrons. He proceeded at once to consider the policy of the Conservative party, and the objections that the Patrons professed to find against it. The Conservative policy, he declared, was the national policy; but the national policy affected more than the tariff or the fiscal question. It was the basis of the perfect union of the different provinces of this Dominion into a united whole. Involved in the carrying out of this policy was the construction of whole. Involved in the carrying out of this policy was the construction of the Intercolonial railway, which bound the eastern provinces together; the C.P.R., which united the whole of the universe west with the east, and the Sault Ste. Marie canal, to complete the great Canadian waterways. All these were the conceptions of the Liberal-Conservative party and for the most part were vigorously oposed by the Libeals.

Another object of the National Policy was the development of the in-dustrial life of the country and to this dustrial life of the country and to this the Liberal-Conservative party devoted its energy with such results that the growth since 1878 has been remarkably rapid and diversified. The Liberal-Conservative policy also showed itself to be a national policy, by what it had done for the development of the agricultural intersts of the country, both at home and abroad.
