

MEIGHEEN AS SUCCESSION TO PREMER; WHITE IS CLOSE SECOND

Large Number of Recommendations Already Made By Members of Senate and Commons.

OTTAWA, July 2.—(Canadian Press Dispatch)—Members of the Senate and House of Commons have been making recommendations of a successor to Sir Robert Borden as prime minister. It is expected that by this evening it is expected they will be complete and Sir Robert will be in a position to place his formal resignation in the hands of the governor-general and to suggest a successor. The recommendations have not been made in a formal manner, but Sir Hon. Arthur Meighen leads in favor at present with Sir Thomas White a close second. Among members there is the feeling that Sir Thomas White, if re-elected, would form a government, which would be a triumph to the public. It is contrary to Sir Thomas' wishes to form a government, but he is in a position to place his formal resignation in the hands of the governor-general and to suggest a successor.

MANY RETIREMENTS INVOLVED IN CHANGING FOSTER, SIFTON AND BURRELL LIKELY TO LEAVE THE POLITICAL LIST.

The formation of a new government, it is thought, will probably involve several retirements from public life. Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell has already indicated that he is not likely to be a member of the new party to be beyond his mandate. He is being strongly pressed to retain his portfolio and is consulting his friends before announcing a definite decision. But there is considerable doubt if he will join the new government. Hon. J. C. Calder on the other hand, is supporting the new party. Three other members of the government are, however, not expected to be re-elected. They are George Foster, Hon. A. L. Sifton and Hon. J. H. Brown. Although they may be induced to remain for the time being, it is probable that their retirement is not far distant.

TO ABOLISH D. S. C. R.

Cabinet reconstruction will attend the elimination of a number of portfolios from the cabinet. It is expected that the D. S. C. R. will be abolished and immigration may again be hatched on to the interior department.
