A Government Inspector going through the peach district of Essex county has found that an orchard in the vicinity of Ruthven is almost totally ruined from Manilla, or peach rot. The disease affects the limbs of the trees first, and in the course of two years the tree dies. The only way to prevnet disease is by cutting off the limbs as soon as it is noticed that they are affected. He thought that the disease had been brought into the country by the importation of trees, and he has asked the government to prohibit the importation of all young

A Wonderful Ship.

One of the most remarkable inventions of One of the most remarkable inventions of the nineteenth century will soon be given a practical test in Lake Ontario. It is what might be called a roller ship, the invention of F. A. Knapp, of Preston, Ont., by means which he claims it is pos-sible to cross the Atlantic in 48 hours. This experimental boat is being constructed at the Polson ship yard in Toronto, and is 110 feet long by 22 feet in diameter. As viewed on the docks the boat appears to be nothing but a huge boiler and one be-comes almost incredulons when informed that it is intended for a ship. The struc-ture consists of an immense cylindrical that it is inferded for a ship. The struc-ture consists of an immense cylindrical paddle wheel inside of which is another cyclinder which is joined to the outside or revolving portion by ball bearings. By means of Engines placed in the inner por-tion of the outside cyclinder, the vessel will be made to resolve rapidly while the inside cylinderretains its equilibrium. The trial will probably be made about August 1st, and is being looked forward to with intense interest by a large number of persons.
