The newspapers everywhere are breaking out in protest against the system which confines children in the school-room and fixes the date of yearly examinations after the beginning of the heated term.

There is much justice in the claim that many hours are thereby stolen from our children which in name of humanity and common-sense could be employed in building up their bodies rather than trying to cram their heads.

Forcing them to additional and more strenuous efforts at a time when nature is demanding a rest, tends to give them a distaste for their studies which they may never outgrow.

In our climate the principal outdoor life our children get for at least six months of the year is in walking to and from the school-room and their home. Even if they have a desire to enjoy outdoor sports, the arduous of books which they carry home with them forbids their indulgence, or they must sit up at an hour when they should be in bed to complete their studies for the day. When the spring comes with its allurements to open air enjoyments they must redouble their energies and increase their hours of study in order to compete with each other in the yearly examinations.

Bridgetown appears to be exceptional in that it holds its public examinations in May, thereby practically closing up the work of the year a month before other schools. But a large minority of the pupils are studying for the provincial examinations to be held in the first week in July and must keep up the strain at any cost to health and temperance, until the racked nerves perhaps do not have time to recover before the school bell again summons them to torture.

Happily, not every child is so constituted that to excel in the knowledge of books is the end and aim of its ambition, otherwise the world would not be progressing as it is today. The problem for the educators is to find just how much knowledge each child can assimilate and in what form. Doubtless future generations will look back aghast at the system today in use of cramming every child with statistics and facts, regardless of its capacity for appreciating or making practical use of such knowledge, while neglecting the training of their eyes and hands in the arts and utilities which keep the world moving in the path of progress.

We are somewhat inclined to differ with those who advocate closing the schools of the province from the first of June till the first of October. If all children could enjoy good home training the plan would work well no doubt, but this would under common circumstances mean an army of children dependent on their only means of whole-

some training, living on the streets of the towns and cities and learning the tricks of the idle and worthless. In country districts there would not be this disadvantage but everything in favor of the plan. In the towns and cities if summer schools or play grounds could be established as in many cities of the States, where the children could be under the supervision of a teacher for certain hours of the day they might be learning as valuable lessons as the schoolroom could teach them, and at the same time many an overworked mother might be relieved of the added care and responsibility she now labors under during the children's vacation season.

Good Crops and Economy

"What Canada needs is a good crop and a year of economy. That will bring us back to normal." This was the statement Mr. Byron E. Walker, President of the Bank of Commerce, made regarding the outlook this year. The bank has received crop reports from all over the west, and the outlook is said to be particularly hopeful.

"A good crop would not alone be sufficient," continued Mr. Walker, "and perhaps it is because we have not been badly enough punished that we do not fully realize that. The West may think that the depression was caused by a bad crop. As a matter of fact, the bad crop was only an incident. The depression would have come without it. In the States they had good crops, but more for their cereals, and their cotton than before, but they had worse trouble financially than Canada had."

"The real cause of depression was the tendency and the practice of people in living ahead of themselves. If there is a splendid crop and Canadians have not learned their lesson, they will start cutting the same wide swath of over-expenditure. Then there will be the same inevitable trouble following. The country needs a year of economy."

"The natural result of a good crop will be that money will be easier. Municipalities will cut themselves up to sell their bonds. Some of them, perhaps, will take advantage of this to plunge into improvements on the old large scale. This will not be justified, for the country needs caution as well as crop."

Fire and Panic in Cleveland Store.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 3.—Seven persons were killed, at least two others were fatally injured, fully thirty more were severely hurt, fully the result of a fire in a store at the intersection of Broadway and Ontario street today.

The fire followed an explosion of fireworks in the store. The exact cause of the explosion has not been determined. A woman who was at the fireworks counter said the stock was ignited by sparks from a device which was being demonstrated to her by a clerk. Fire Chief Wallace, and the store manager are of the opinion that the pieces were ignited by an arc light.

Immediately following the explosion an alarm of fire was sounded and the panic seized the hundreds of clerks and shoppers, a wild rush was made for the doors and windows. Many jumped from the second and third floors. The store, which is located near the busiest corner in the downtown district, was well filled with shoppers, mostly women and children. Practically all of the clerks were young girls.

Although the explosion of the fireworks caused considerable consternation the real panic did not occur until some one shouted "Fire." For crowd. Then, crazed by the possibility of an instant death, a rush came over the top of injury or death, all on the main floor rushed for the front and rear doors. The front doorway soon was jammed, the rear door was too small for all who sought safety there, and the rear windows were closed with iron bars.

Several women forced to the rear of the store by the approaching flames sought safety under a counter where their bodies were found two hours after the explosion. The five women had been suffocated. The sixth victim, the four-year-old son of Mrs. George Parker, was knocked to the floor in the first panic. There he lay unconscious and trampled upon until suffocated by smoke.

Save Daylight by Changing Clocks.

London, June 30.—The commission appointed by the house of commons to consider the daylight saving scheme, full details of which have been cabled, has tabled a report favoring the introduction of a bill to achieve the object by altering clocks one hour on the third Sunday of April and altering them again on the third Sunday of September.

The measure by which the United Kingdom is to be lured into starting the day's work one hour ahead of the time indicated by the sun, has received the unqualified blessing of the select committee of the house of commons, and all indications now point to its becoming effective next April. The bill proposes to advance the clock one hour in April in order to promote the greater use of daylight and to give the masses an hour more play time by light of day. The greatest objection to the measure came from the stock exchange, which presented the argument that its business with America would be dislocated.
