## OLD SIGNS IN LONDON.

Taverns That Have Been Famous for Centuries.

(From the Pall Mall Gazette.) OLD signs are not of necessity inn signs:
but all have the deepest interest for the
London typographer. Names which at
first sight look nonsensical and arbitrary
are often accounted for when we remember some house sign or some semi-heraldic

That taverns have preserved their signs, while other houses have discarded them, gives us an interest in the taverns out of all proportion to their beauty or anti-

quity. In some cases, too, the device which has left its mark upon a street is neither that of an inn nor any other house. Maiden lane, covent Garden, so on an estate belonging to the Mercers Company, whose badge, the head of the Virgin Mary—the Maiden—is represented in half a dozen places in St. Martin's lane and Long Acre.

A still more interesting kind of sign, one probably of high antiquity, may be seen in Oxford street, opposite to Stratford place. On the north side, before 1400, stood the thouch of St. John, Tyburn, with its vestry and its little burial ground, and in the hollow a bridge carried the road over "the bourne from whence no traveller returns."
