Word has been received of the death of the Rev. Dr. Mullins, Foreign Secretary of the London (Congregational) Missionary Society. Some time since, at his own earnest request, he was sent out with a band of Missionaries, to establish a mission on Lake Tanganyika, in Central Africa. A telegram from Aden, dated August 23rd, announces his death.

She was always a flighty and eccentric woman; but the painful history of her last ten vears has been such that charity might well wish to hide from the pitying gaze of the world. Having known well the interior facts of this wretched case, I do not hesitate to say, that Brother Hall has been a very long-suffering, as well as a sorely suffering man. Of his conduct under this affliction, none of his friends need be ashamed."
