The Committee desire to mention the great care and pains bestowed by Mr Carter and Dr Strathey in examining and selecting melodies and harmonies, and the kind attention of Mr. Clark and others in reviewing them, and in giving their testimony to the general and hall hnowledge and ability exhibited in them. It is likewise proper to notice the excellent temper and liberal spirit shown both by Mr. Lovell, from whose press the book is intended to issue, and of Mr. Rowsell and Mr. Nordheimer, with whom some negotiations were held
