these two Communist powers whose interests are so deeply engaged in the Vietnam queson. But I am convinced that they are desirous of reaching a peaceful settlement, ategst other reasons for the beneficial effect this will have on Last-West relations in teral. Thus, despite very substantial differences between us, there seems to be some entity of view as to the desire to see the conflict brought to an end.

Poland and the Seviet Union were new to me. I must say that even after this rief visit I think the forces which help to shape the policies of their governments more clearly discernible. I saw the reconstruction of the historic city of Warsaw, hideously scarred by war. I saw ancient Krakow and the horror that was Auschwitz, we silent witness to the massacre of how many millions of the Jewish people. I saw scow, the vibrant capital of one of the two most powerful countries on earth. I saw mingrad, that creation of Peter the Great, which lost almost a million of its inhabitets in 900 days of wartime siege. And had it not been for bad weather, I would have sen Kiev, the historic capital of the Ukraine.

As I visited all these places and talked with their people, I further efirmed my assessment of what is taking place in Eastern Europe — and there is cerully change afoot. My thoughts also turned instinctively to the hundreds of thousands people in Canada of Folish descent, of Ukrainian and Russian descent. I understood heir love for the countries from which they and their ancestors had come and I understood better some of the sources of the great contributions which they have brought to tada.

I was nonoured to be received in Rome by His Heliness the Pope and was again pressed by his wise and compassionate understanding of the troubles of the world as all as by his great spirit of ecumenism which has done so much to bring the Christian purches closer together. His Holiness commended the efforts of Canada to bring about acce. I told him that the leadership which he and other great religious leaders were
