Inquiries of the Ministry

While I am standing may I apologize to certain members to whom I inadvertently gave an incorrect assessment before the recess. I said in the committee that there would be a hearing, but I was thinking in terms of a discontinuance. The CTC does not have authority to hold a hearing on this particular matter, but as I say I will discuss the matter in line with the representations made.

Mr. Stanley Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary question which is based on the undertaking the minister gave us on December 10. What has happened in respect of the offer he made to convene a meeting of the CN management with members of constituencies affected in order to discuss the discontinuance of trains 5 and 6.

Mr. Jamieson: Nothing has happened. Perhaps it is my fault. I was under the impression that hon. members interested would get in touch with me and indicate a time. If you will let me know the time I will be glad to do it.

Mr. Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): The offer was accepted on December 10.

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Prince Albert): In connection with this discontinuance of railway service will the minister press Canadian National Railways not to act in the arbitrary and altogether cavalier manner it has? After all, Parliament votes the money for the CNR and Parliament should have some right to say whether or not such action is justified.

Mr. Jamieson: Yes, Mr. Speaker. I repeat that I shall be very glad to make these representations to both railways, but I have to emphasize that where it is only a reduction in service there is no legal mechanism that can be employed. Where there is a discontinuance the CTC has indicated it will hold hearings on such discontinuance.

Mr. Diefenbaker: I realize this is so, but what about Parliament? Parliament votes the money, and surely these railway services should not be discontinued in the manner in which the CNR is now carrying on.

Mr. Orlikow: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. In view of the fact that the so-called reduction is in fact a complete cancellation, if only for some months, would the minister consider the possibility of amending the legislation so that this kind of discontinuing could be considered by the CTC?

SAINT-ROMUALD—LAY-OFF OF 325 EMPLOYEES OF B.V.D. COMPANY

Has the minister considered the possibility for the government to subsidize the construction of 24 Greek ships so as to prevent the Davie Shipbuilding yards in Lauzon from closing down?
