and prostitute, to the Purposes of Faction, the boasted Liberty of the Press? What the constitutional Liberty of the Press is, it may be difficult to fay with Precision: Perhaps, like the Privilege of the Peerage, it is more secure by not being strictly and minutely defined: And every one who wishes well to this Liberty, (as I very cordially do) should wish also that the Blasphemy and Licentiousness of the present Age, the wanton Abuse of Religion and Government, may not render it necessary for the Legislature to determine its Boundaries by a clear and positive Law.

But I think it is easy to say what is not the constitutional Liberty of the Press. It is not then the Overflowing of personal Calumny and Invective; It is not the Sowing of Sedition in the Hearts of the People, and the seducing of their Affections from their native Sovereign; It is not the torturing of Texts of Scripture to the most profane Senses, in equal Defiance of the Laws of God and Man. Whoever com-·mits these enormous Offences against his Counitry, and yet pretends to shelter himself under the Privilege of the Press, appears to me to be acting the Part of another Clodius, who first destroyed the House of Cicero, and afterwards had the Affurance to confecrate the whole
