EFFICIENT HOUSEKEEPING

Real Mexican Cooking

Just now a flood of recipes labeled "Mexican" are being published, and looking over them one gets the impression that the food used or made is attractive to us. In fact, the soldier boys write back that chili con carne is a deception as made and eaten in Mexico. The climate, they say, is such that even fresh meat spoils quickly and the pepper and pepper sauce are a necessity to disguise flavors that could not be so easily obtained elsewhere. The "chili" or oil-covered stewed beans, are not to be compared to the real "chili" article, and the fried peppers are always flavored with garlic, and this penetrating flavor spreads over all else, even the famous tamales and their cooking.

Just why anyone with access to our good markets should want to ape Mexican cooking, or any other Mexican thing, is a mystery. But if you want to cook a la Mexicana, provide yourself with corn meal, ground very coarse, in place of flour; use twice as much fat as you need and have a good fire as you can make. In Mexico there are few ranges and no up-to-date utensils in the poor native's home, and the upper class native seems to consider such plebeian ideas as good food or sagittary kitchens. All the articles are prepared in one bowl and one thing is cooked at a time because utensils are so scarce. The tortillas are baked on hot stones, or wrapped in leaves and cooked in embers. They taste much like everything else—very queer. It would be base flattery to call such cookery heathenish.

As regards their graves—the plural is out of place here, for as a nation, Mexico has but one grave, and that is olive oil and melted fat and a precipitate of slush—no one ever learned how it was made. It has but one good quality: it covers up the taste of all but the biting hot peppers and reduces the delicacies of the nation to a common level.

You say you have tasted good Mexican dishes? Why, certainly you have, but they have been Frenchified or Anglicized or Americanized until the origin, but all people's own mother wouldn't know it. Tamales, for instance, are fine, but the Creole tamales is far and away in advance of the Spanish dish, and the imported chefs of the great hotels make them after the better style and label them Spanish or Mexican on the bill of fare to attract attention.

Creole tamales: Boil a tender young chicken until the meat shreds from the bones, chop the meat fine with thyme, a bay leaf and parsley to season. Add a dash of pepper and a small onion minced, salt and just a pinch of curry powder. Brown all this in hot butter and add a cup of rolled, sifted cracker crumbs and a cup of mashed, well seasoned potatoes. Brown well and add as much cayenne pepper as you like. Divide the mixture into equal parts and roll each part in a clean corn husk. Tie firmly and drop into boiling water and cook hard five minutes. Drain, remove the strings from the husk and send to table very hot. Delicious? Of course, but not with olive oil and garlic and too much pepper on them.

BIGGER PRIZES FOR POULTRY.

QUELPH, May 22.—A meeting of the poultry committee of the winter fair board was held here today to consider the prize list for next winter's show. Those present were: W. J. Teale of Quelph, president of the Western Ontario Poultry Association; John Saunders and W. McNeil of London; L. H. Baldwin of Toronto; A. W. Tyson and Prof. Graham of Quelph, and Secretary R. W. Wade, Toronto. The executive committee have authorized a 20 per cent. increase in the prize list for next winter's poultry show, thus running the amount up to nearly \$4,500. This committee met today to deal with appointment of the added money.

TEN OF MAJORITY FOR TOLLS REPEAL

Democratic Leaders Confident That Senate Will Adopt Panama Bill.

Canadian Press, Resolute.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Democratic leaders in the senate were confident tonight that the Panama Canal tolls exemption, repeals bill and the arbitration amendments will be disposed of next week. Senator Kern, leader of the majority, said a vote would be taken May 26 or shortly afterwards, and added that the repeal bill would be passed by a majority of at least ten.

RAINFALL EXTINGUISHED BUSH FIRES IN NORTH.

Word was received at the office of the Timiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway Commission yesterday that the rainfall has been sufficiently heavy to put out the bush fires that had been raging for some days in the northern part of the province. Chairman Egan, who returned from his monthly trip of inspection, when interviewed by The World said that the worst fire had threatened to be the Tush fire, which experienced the arrival of the rain alone preventing great havoc being wrought.

BRANTFORD, May 22.—The ashes of John Balfour, a former prominent resident of this city, arrived in town this morning by express from Glendale, California, and will be interred here.
