Owing to the numerous failures in British Columbia recently and the unsatisfactory financial condition the wholesale grocers have threatened to shorten credit. They claim that the custom now in vogue in Vancouver among retailers to delay payment for three and even six months beyond maturity, has become, to say the least, embarassing. The Wholesale Grocers' association and the 'letail Grocers' association subsequently met to talk the matter over, the retailers blame the unsatisfactory state of affairs on the consumers, who had got into the habit in too many instances, of letting their accounts run until they had got so large that they were not alle to pay, or until they were intreatened with legal proceedings. The wholesale grocers intimated that the custom must be stopped, as in most every instance, they (the wholesalers) were obliged to pay cash for their goods, and as a protection to themselves, they had decided to shorten credit, thus compelling retailers to do the same with their customers. The Itenail Grocers' association met tegether subsequently and decided to extensively advertise the fact, that all customers without exception, must pay their bills before the twentieth of the month, following that month in customers without exception, must pay their bills before the twentieth of the month, following that month in which their bill matured. Falling to do this they would be allowed three days grace, after which time they would again be notified, if the bill was not then paid at once it would be put in the hands of collectors. This plan failing the incorrigable customer would be black-listed, and would be unable to obtain goods on credit at any other store. The Itetail Grocers' association are careful to explain that owing to the action of the wholesalers they are compelled to take this action.
