great Importance in any Attempts we may make on Canada; of great Importance to the Trade of Nova Scatia, and not so remote from the Great Bank, as not to be of some Confequence in that respect. And there still remains another Confideration; for the French can over-run the Low-Countries at Pleasure, can seize to-morrow what they give up to day; so that after having made a Surrender of Cape Breton (which the French could have never taken but by Means of our Ministry, nor we ever hope to recover) we may fee our Allies too, divested of that Country, which thro' our Compulsion the Empress-Queen has so dearly purchased by Cessions made in Italy to Don Philip, of Territories (which the French in vain used their utmost Efforts to conquer) and Restitutions to the Duke of Modena and the Genoese-I will leave it to your Judgment, if we have not renounced all Claim to the Islands of St. Lucia, St. Vincent and Tobago, tho' there is not the least Word of this Cession in the Treaty published by Authority, as the French have been very bufy ever fince the Peace in making Settlements there, without the least Molestation from our Governor, who was used
