To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The petition of your majesty's most dutiful and loving subjects, the lords of fiefs, landed proprietors, citizens, merchants, and traders, inhabitants of the district of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, in North America.

"Your majesty hath been pleased, during this " time, to grant them the privilege of fitting upon " juries, not only in all civil, but also in all cri-" minal cases; but at the same time they were given " to understand, that they were obstacles to being in any employs, whether civil or military; they " were, and are, startled at the idea of such an exclusion. Your petitioners, who ardently with to ferve and to be useful to their country, flatter themselves, that your majesty will be pleased to e permit them to participate with your ancient " subjects, in the rights and privileges of English " citizens. The irreproachable conduct which "they have observed, since the conquest, and " their submission to government, should be looked upon as faithful testimonies that they will " never abuse your majesty's goodness. " shall
