

SIDEWALKS DESTROYED

Citizens Complain That Teamsters Are Damaging New Walks by Driving Across Them.

The police census, which was taken order of the North Toronto Council, mpleted and shows North Toronto's population to be 6655, as against 5217 year ago, an increase of 1438. This is certainly a record-breaker, as North Toronto had less than 1500 of a popuation when it was incorporated as a town, 22 years ago. During the number of years of the depression North Toronto made no headway for about 15 years. Even the assessment fell from \$2,000,000 to \$850,000, when it was at low ebb, but now the assessment is well up over \$6,000,000, and dividing the increase of population for the 22 years increase of population for the 22 years of the town's existence, each year gained 234 new innabitants. Of course the increase of population has been only noticeacie during the past eight years, previous to winch there was a standstin, but highly no a steady increase of population since the town's incorporation, it ingures out that there was an annual gain of 40 per cent.

Considerable displeasure is expressed by citizens of the town who have to pay local improvement taxes for the sidewarks on their properties and which they originally intended should be used by pedestrians only. Now teamsters are using these sidewarks for hauling their loads to their destination. The police officers cannot be blamed for not bringing these oftenders to justice, as it is a physical impossibility for two men to be everywhere in a territory of four square miles, yet something should be some to prevent this wanton destruction of sidewalks by heavy teams.

North Toronto is becoming part of the city on the 15th of next month, and moore Park on the 16th. When these two new territories are annexed there is still a V-shaped piece of land located between Lawton avenue and Yonge street. Some years ago when Deer Park was annexed the city refused to annex that piece for fear they would have to keep up Yonge street past Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and on the representation of York Township Council, the railway board ordered the city has done so far, and which the city has to do in future.
