CHARTER DAY AT VICTORIA DEGREES AND PRIZES GIVEN

C. F. Connor Awarded Prince of Wales Gold Medal for Proficiency.

"Charter Day" in Victoria College was happily commemorated last night by the presentation by Chancellor Burwash of the medals, scholarships and prizes to the successful students of the season 1906. There was a large representation of the friends of the college present, including, among others, Justice Riddell, Hon. Speaker St. John, Justice Britton, Edward Gurney, and a large delegation from the staff of sister institutions.

The laureate address was given by Prof. R. P. Bowles, M. A., B. D., the latest acquisition to the teaching staff of Victoria College. "The Place of Hellenism in the Theological Faculty" was the subject of Prof. Bowles' discourse, which was a scholarly effort. He urged upon the graduating class the necessity for adapting the knowledge acquired to practical use.

Justice Riddell, who claims Victoria as his alma mater, voiced the sentiments of many old-time graduates present in the hope that Victoria would, in the future, as in the past, bring honor to herself and to her graduates. The attendance of lady friends of the college was especially large.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS PREPARE FOR OWN FUNERAL AGED PAIR THEN SUICIDE

Dane, Aged 63, Unable to Find Work, Drinks Acid, and Wife Dies With Him.

Hamilton, Oct. 16.—(Special).—A double suicide, under most pathetic circumstances, was discovered this morning. Last evening Andrew Dane, 63, a Dane, and his wife, who came here a short time ago from Palmerston, drank carbolic acid, and their dead bodies, lying side by side on their bed at 11 Keith-street, were not found till this morning.

They were about 63 years of age. The wife was an invalid, and at all places where the husband applied for work he was told that he was too old. Completely discouraged, they decided to end their lives. All preparations were carefully made. They laid their best clothes out on the bed, ready for their funeral, and the two glasses in which they drank the acid were found on a dresser in the room.

THANKSGIVING POULTRY PRICE

Turkeys Will Be Scarce on the Local Market.

While the outlook for the Thanksgiving dinner is, for the ordinary man, none of the brightest, inasmuch as the time honored associations of roast turkey and goose are concerned, there will not be much to complain of after all. That the turkey crop is a comparatively small one is a fact, but the fault lies rather with the farmer than with the turkey. There are probably more turkeys to the acre in Canada than in any other country, for instance, than for some years past, but stress of work has left the turkey to look after himself up to the present, with the result that few are well fed, and the shipments to the Toronto market at the present time will not be very large. Geese are in much better shape, and ducks are rolling fat.

"I never saw such fine ducks, more especially the wild ones, of which we are receiving a great many," said Chas. Dunnigan, the Yonge-street butcher. "They are all splendid birds and come from the northern lakes, many from around Peterborough."

Various grades of poultry are quoted as follows: Turkeys, choice, 22c; geese, 12-12c to 14c; young chickens, 14c; hens, 14c; ducks, 14c to 16c per pound. Wild ducks are worth \$1.50 a pair. For meats, these prices are given: No. 1 sirloin, 18c per pound; rib roast, 16c to 14c; lamb, 17c to 18c; mutton, 14c to 16c.
