GOSSIP OF THE TURF

Considerable excitement was in evidence at New Orleans when a jockey pulled a horse. In some places wags might mention get excited when a jockey rides an honest race.

Jockey Kent was suspended by St. Louis on Tuesday. The case tried today, and Judge Hamilton suspended Jockeys A. C. Koerner and W. Fischer for a week on account of rough riding.

E. Corrigan has shown that he still has some bitterness in his make-up by refusing to race his horses at the Fair Grounds. Corrigan's temper sometimes defeats him. The one way he can make the Fair Grounds glad is by keeping his horses at City Park.

The Elm Ridge racetrack in Kansas City will probably reopen next spring with a running meeting, as the result of the decision by the state supreme court on the anti-pooling law. When the anti-pooling law was passed the track was closed and the Oldham test case was filed.

The Missouri supreme court has decided that the anti-pooling law does not prohibit persons from selling pools on races to be run in this state when bets are registered by telephone in another state. The case tried was that of Charles Oldham of Kansas City, who was convicted of keeping a booth for selling pools on races at Elm Ridge racetrack, where bets were registered in Kansas City. Kan. Judge Gantt wrote the opinion reversing the case and discharging the defendant. All the judges concurred.

Bates Gallagher, the Toronto sleazebag rider and trainer, has returned from Washington. He had a good year, and has signed to ride next season for C. C. Smith, who took over Garth's jumping this year. Gallagher will not go to New Orleans or the coast this winter, but will join his stable at Washington.

The cold spell of the last ten days has checked active training operations at the Kentucky Association track in Lexington, and held trainers down to the walk trot and slow gallop with the horses in their care. Superintendent Ross has had to make the most of the fine shape for daily use, and so during the cold weather every horse trained here will have a chance to take his regular exercise every 24 hours.

Jockey Arthur Redfern, who was a short time ago a conspicuous figure in turf circles, has been dropping out of it somewhat. It is now at Oakland, Redfern will do the stable riding for Boots Durnell. Arthur is a bit heavy at present, but he is positive that he can make the riding weight without doing himself any harm. Durnell thinks well of Redfern's ability, and will rather take a chance with Redfern at his high weight than with some cook of lighter poundage.

Thursday was the getaway day of the Old Glen sale at Madison Square Garden. The sale revealed few high-class horses, the two prices being given for Lass Yager, which went for \$785. A total of 102 head were disposed of during the last day, bringing a total of \$19,700. The grand total for the nine days of the sale was \$243,500 for a total of 1013 head, an average of \$243.
