

MANILA. April 19 .- The Town of Iloilo, Island of Panay, was totally destroyed by fire this morning, with the result that 20,000 persons are homeless. The conflagration is still raging and, owing to the heavy wind blowing, it is beyond control. 230 DROWN.

BERLIN, April 19.—Colonial Direct-r Dernburg stated to-day that a ca-le message had been received from he governor of the Island of Yap, announcing that a disastrous typhoon awept over the Caroline Islands on Good Friday last and that 230 of the 600 natives of the Uluithi group were drowned. Cocoanut trees were destroyed and famine threatened the surviving na-tives.



Brockville Labor Men Will Instal a Plant and Save Money.

BROCKVILLE, April 19.-(Special.)-The workingmen of Brockville have taken the initial steps toward organization of a co-operative company for the manufacture of bread. The shares are fixed at \$2 each, and sufficient money will be subscribed to install a plant.

It is proposed to sell bread at 4 cents per 11-2 pound loaf. The bakers are selling the 11-2 pound loaf for 6 cents.
