The co-insurance clause is as follows: "It is a part of the consideration of this policy and the basis upon which the rate of premium is fixed that the assured shall maintain insurance on the property covered by this policy of not less than 75 per cent. of the actual cash value thereof, and that failing to do so the assured shall sections. this policy of not less than 75 per cent. of the actual cash value thereof, and that failing to do so the assured shall be a co-insurer to the extent of such deficit, and in that capacity shall bear his, her, or their proportion of any loss." A GIANT COAL TRUST. Already Raised the Price of Har

New York, Feb. 5.—A new trust, greater, richer, stronger, more important than any other trust now in existence, has been formed and began actual operations yesterday. Involving thousands of miles of railroad and more than \$2,000,000,000 of capital of the Vanderbilts and J. Pierpont Morgan, it is far ahead of the wildest dream of wealth and monopoly which the late Jay Gould ever conceived.

Its operations will make the profits of a gold ring seem insignificant and trifling.

trifling.
The anthracite coal mining and rail-read companies sold last year 46,000,000 tons of coal at an average whole-sale price of \$3.08. It is proposed by the new trust to raise the price to \$4 a ton. On decreased production an increased profit of \$38,000,000 is assured and will be divided among 11 companies. It is easy to estimate what a percapita tax this means upon the country.

This trust has already advanced the price of coal 35 cents a ton. This increase is only the first step, but it means over \$15,000,000 increased cost to consumers. The new trust is a giant compared to which the Standard Oil, the Sugar, the Tobacco and the Leather trusts are mere pigmies.

Excluding bonds, the new coal and railroad trust stands for nearly \$1,900,000 capital and 24,530 miles of railroad. This capital stands for two and a half times the entire bonded debt of the United States.

The advance in the price of coal made by the trust is the first step. It is proposed soon to get about 90 cents a ton more for coal than last year's prices.

Wheat opened ½c higher than last night's closing, and has ruled higher the better part of the session. Northwest receipts were somewhat smaller than yesterday, 446 cars, against 101 cars a year ago. The firmness was largely caused owing to the confirmation of the large quantity taken here for millers yesterday, amounting to about 200,000 bushels. A number of local traders who sold out on the break were heavy buyers on the decline, which helped to force a higher range of prices, May selling at one time at 68½c. Bradstreet's report was a big surprise, showing the enormous decrease of over 4,000,000 buskels, but it did not have any effect on the market, as around 68c the big professionals started selling heavily, forcing the price down to 66%c. On the decline some buying took place, railying the market about half a cent. On weak spots we advise purchases.

LETTER TO DR. JAMESON.

MISSIVE THAT CAUSED HIM TO IN-VADE THE TRANSVAAL.

Johannesburg Times of Jan. nts the full text of the letter sent the Uitlanders to Dr. Jameson, ch induced him to invade the Trans vaal. Among the signers of this letter is John Hays Hammond, the Am erican mining engineer, who is now a prisoner at Pretoria. The letter, which was picked up on the battle-field where Jameson's party were de-feated and captured, is as follows: "Johannesburg, Dec. 20.

"Dor. Jameson:

"Dear Sir,—The position of matters in this State has become so critical that at no distant period there will be a conflict between the Government and the Uitlander population. It is scarcely necessary for us to recapitulate what is now a matter of history. Suffice it that the position of thousands of Englishmen and others is rapidly becoming intolerable. Not satisfied with making the Uitlanders pay virtually the whole of the revenue of the country, while denying them representation, the policy has been steadily to encroach upon the liberty of the subject and to undermine the security of property to such an extent as to leave a very deep-seated cause of discontent and danged.

"A foreign corporation of Hollanders is to a considerable extent controlling our destinles, and in conjunction with the Boer leaders is endeavoring to cast them in a mould which is wholly foreign to the genius of the people. Every public act betrays the most positive hostility not only to everything English, but to the neighboring States as well. In short, the internal policy of the Government is such as to have roused into antagonism not only practically the whole body of Uitlanders, but a large number of the Boers, while its external policy has exasperated the neighboring States, causing the possibility of great danger to the peace and independence of the republic.

"Fublic feeling is in a condition of smoul-

danger to the peace and independence of the republic.

"Public feeling is in a condition of smouldering discontent. All the petitions of the people have been refused with a greater or less degree of contempt, and in the debate on the franchise petition, signed by nearly 40,000 people, one member challenged the Ultianders to fight for the right they asked for, and not a single member spoke against him. Not to go into details, we may say that he Government have called into existence all the elements ne-

cannot avoid this step, and we cannot but believe that you will not fail the copie to the rescue of the people who would be so situated. New York, Feb. 6.—A despatch to The Journal from Johannesburg, South Africa, says the greatest excitement prevails in Johannesburg. The next three days will be anxious ones for all of us here. They will be anxious days for John Hays Hammond as well. However, he and the other prisoners continue well, although the jail in which they are confined is very unhealthy.

The Pretorian Government has ordered the Boer troops to occupy the heights above the city. The Germans, incited by Emperor William's message to Kruger, have formed a volunteer force to police the city, and the feeling against them among the rest of the Uitlanders is very strong.

Ennator Horgan Gives Notice of a Rather Unique Amendment.

Washington, Feb. 6.—In the Senate to-day Senator Quay's resolution to recommit the House Tariff Bill with the Free Coinage substitute to the Finance Committee, with instructions to report them back as separate propositions, went over till Monday. Senator Morgan gave notice of an amendment to the resolution, the point of which is that countries which will, by law, make United States silver full legal tender money, in payment of customs and of goods imported to this country, shall have a deduction of 10 per cent. allowed in United States customs duty on such goods if imported in United States vessels or in vessels belonging to that country.
