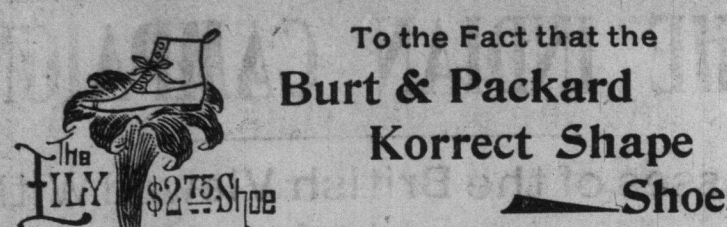

Another Great Singer Coming.

Another of the great sopranos of Europe
is soon to be heard in the Massey Hall in
grand concert, and it is to be hoped that
these efforts to give our citizens the benefit
of events of this kind will not be over-
looked, but will, on the other hand, be
appreciated by all music students and
others. The artist referred to is none
other than the celebrated Miss Benner.
The following short sketch of her career
will no doubt be found interesting.
She was born in Brussels (Belgium), be-
ing the daughter of Henry Benner, a Hol-
lander, who had come to Belgium in his
early days, and was professor of the violin
at the Royal Conservatory of Music in
Brussels.
She began learning the art of singing
under the direction of said Conservatory,
and later on with Charnoutte, who
became the pupil of the celebrated
French baritone, Faure, who had heard
Dina Benner in Brussels and was struck
by the great dispositions of the world-beater.
Dina Benner has long been the protégée
of Her Majesty the Queen and King of
Belgium, and is held in very high favor at
the Court of Holland.

of the Crown (Chevalier de la Couronne),
which she holds in the Kingdom of the
Netherlands.
In Belgium, Holland, and all over France
she has been the greatest enthusiasm, and in England,

present from distinguished personages, hav-
ing sung on several occasions at the courts
of Belgium, Holland, and Russia.

the 23rd of next week.
