PIER DELASCO IS NO MORE.

The Well-Known Canadian Basso Passes Away in Italy, Whither He Went to Spend the Winter in Quest of Health.

News has been received of the death at Sorrento. Italy, of Sig. Pier Delasco, the well-known Toronto basso and musical instructor. Mrs. Delasco was with her hus band when he passed away.

Pier Delasco was a representative Canadian singer. Born on a farm near Bradford. Ont., about 35 years ago, he early developed musical ability, and when he grew to manhood his powerful voice made him much sought after in local musical circles. After studying for some time in Canada he went to Europe, taking courses in Naples, Rome, Paris and London, and appearing in opera in all those cities with success. His real name was Peter Robinson, and his stage name was taken from his maternal ancestors, who were of Spanish extraction and bore the name of Delasco. Mr. Robinson's voice was a powerful basso, of the profundo quality, nevertheless he always called himself a basso cantante.

As narrated by hunself, his career as a student in Europe was full of difficulties, and none but a determined nature would have surmounted them; yet he always sald luck was with him and he was able to keep going. While his operatic repertoire was extensive, he made his greatest success as Mephisto in "Faust," which was his favorite role. He sang in French, Spanish and Italian, as well as English, and made his greatest triumphs in London, Eng.

About cight years ago Mr. Robinson returned to Canada and frequently appeared in concert in Toronto. In the operatic senson of 1893-94 he was for a time primo basso in the Emma Juch Opera Company, but left it before the season was over, owing, it is said, to a disagreement with the business management. He then quened a studio here and soon had a large clientele, among whom some have become prominent, notably Miss Margaret Huston and Mr.F.X. Mercier.

Delasco's last really heavy work in Toronto was on May 23, 1898, in the opera "William Tell," given (without costumes or acting), in the Mutual-street Rink by the Original Delasco to Miss Edith Dixon less than two years ago, his illness society, under the baton of Sig.
