The City Legal Department yesterday afternoon consigned the overcrowding suit to the courts. The writ reads as follows:

The corporation of the City of Toronto, and R. A. Staton, who sues on behalf of immself and all other ratepayers and inhabitants of the City of Toronto, against the Toronto Railway Company.

The plaintiff's claim is for damages for breach of the agreement between the City of Toronto and the defendants, providing for the operation of the street railways by the defendants in the City of Toronto, and dated Sept. 1, 1891, and for a mandamus and injunction, declaration and interpretation, as here set out.

The plaintiffs claim that the defendants have broken the terms of the said agreement in that the defendants have from time to time, and still habitually overcrowd their cars used in the operation of the street railway system, and for an injunction to restrain the defendants from continuing to overcrowd their said cars.

The plaintiffs also claim that the defendants use, in the operation of the said system, cars which are not of the most approved design for service and comfort, as provided by the said agreement, but which are dilapidated, worn
