

CITY GOT CHECKUE FOR \$31,029.55 SHARE OF EXHIBITION PROFITS

Mayor Urquhart Explains Why He Stopped Street Railway Effort to Get Power.

The Board of Control was waited upon yesterday afternoon by the executive of the Industrial Exhibition Association and a cheque for \$31,029.55 representing the city's share of the profits from the last Fair. There were present W. K. McNaught, president, W. E. Wellington, vice-president, Dr. J. O. Orr, manager, and secretary, and J. P. Edwards, treasurer, and Directors E. Strachan Cox, R. Y. Ellis, A. D. Sheppard, Fleming, Dunn, Ward and J. Knox Leslie. President McNaught presented the financial statement, showing a total revenue of \$218,717.40 from all sources. The expenditures for Dec. 1 amounted to \$189,446.03, excluding capital account on which \$20,112.88 was expended. The amounts reserved for outstanding accounts for working expenses according to the lease, and for special subscriptions for exhibition purposes only totaled \$20,876, leaving the amount above stated to be turned over to the City Treasurer. Mr. McNaught stated that the improvements made had been of a substantial nature and they were among the best equipped buildings on the continent. Dr. Orr thanked the Mayor and Controllers for the confidence they had displayed and referred to the fact that the association had returned to the Dominion government \$30,000 of the \$50,000 grant, which was a record. The Mayor was very grateful at having the matter settled in such a satisfactory manner, and congratulated the city, as the Exhibition was in much better shape than previous years, and this year practically made a profit of \$70,000. He had offered to make a temporary arrangement with the street railway company, but would allow the company to secure power while protecting the interests of the city, but he strongly objected to any connection being made without permission. In this view the board unanimously agreed and sustained the Mayor's action.

City Engineer Tustard yesterday removed 200 feet of cable that had been strung by the Toronto Railway Company for the purpose of effecting a connection with the Metropolitan Railway Company, in order to obtain the necessary power to carry out the immediate pressure on the street car lines. The Engineer was accompanied to North Toronto by a squad of men from the Yorkville Fire Station, and three policemen, but the wire was cut without any intervention by the Metropolitan Railway employees, who were at work on the job. No connection had been made, but it would have been accomplished by noon.

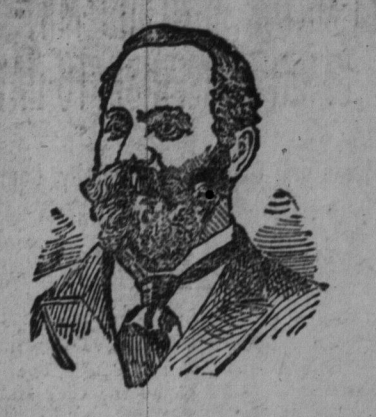
