

## SMOTHERED IN BED

Sad Ending of a Young Babe's Life-Two Recent Criminal Suits Recalled.

"Oh, mother, come here, quick! Charley's dead!" was the horrorstricken cry of Margaret Ridler, who lives with her parents on St. James street, when she awoke about 8:30 yesterday morning, and discovered that her 4-months-old infant lay dead beside her. the facts are considered. Some time over a year ago a private at Wolseley Barracks named Cooper, a married man, led astray the girl, who is about 16 years of age.
