SAD SLAUGHTER

Useless Dogs Destroyed a Valuable
Herd of Shropshire Sheep.

Woodstock, May 23.—Mr. T. C. Patterson was here Sunday morning, summoned by a telegram from his foreman at Eastwood, which told him of the total destruction of his famous flock of Shropshire sheep by dogs during the previous night. Those not killed are so mutilated as to be useless. Any lambs that escaped are dying for want of their mothers. The pastures are all littered with carcasses, and the sheep have evidently been driven all over the farm. There was a bunch of valuable rams being got together for the Northwest, all of which are killed. The flock was established in 1880, and was the first Canadian flock to come under American registration. The loss is a serious one.

Proceedings at "The House in the Woods."

Personnel of Three Important Committees.

Sara Bernhardt's "Hamlet" the Cause of a Duel.

The Punitive Column Sent Against the Waziris Withdrawn.

Ten Persons Drowned by the Up setting of a Ferryboat.

Weather Favorable for Floating the Stranded Paris-Report That the Queen's Eyes Will Have To Be Subjected to an Operation.

The Hague, May 23.—Following is a list of the members of the first committee: Honorary presidents, Count Von Munster, head of the German delegation, and Mr. Andrew D. White, head of the American delegation; effective president, M. De Boernaert, head of the Belgian delegation; vice-president, A. P. C. Van Karnebeek, head of the delegation of the Netherlands. It is divided into two sections, war and marine.

The vice-presidents of the war section are: Lieut.-General Abdulla Pasha, of the Turkish delegation; Major-General Ardash, of the British delegation, and Brigadier-General Monnier, of the French delegation. The vice-presidents of the marine section are: Vice-Admiral Fisher, of the British delegation; Vice-Admiral Poitau, of the French delegation, and Captain Siegel, of the German delegation.

The second committee is constituted as follows: Honorary presidents, the Duke De Tetuan, head of the Spanish delegation; Turkish Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, and Count Von Weisersheim, head of the Austrian-Hungarian delegation; effective president, Prof. De Maertens, of the Russian delegation.

It is also divided into two sections, Red Cross and Brussels conference. The vice-presidents of the Red Cross section are: General Thaulow and Dr. Nith, head of the Swiss delegation. The vice-presidents of the Brussels conference section are: Prof. Von Stengel, of the German delegation, and General Zoukowsky, of the Italian delegation.

The third committee is composed as follows: Honorary president, Count Nigra, head of the Italian delegation, and Sir Julian Pauncefote, head of the British delegation; effective president, M. Bourgeois, head of the French delegation; vice-presidents, M. De Bille, head of the Danish delegation; Baron Destourmelles De Constant, of the French delegation; Count De Macedo, head of the Portuguese delegation; Herr Meyer, Signor Compil and Dr. Zorn.

TEN PERSONS DROWNED.

Berlin, May 23.—A disastrous accident occurred today at Simbach, Bavaria, where ten persons were drowned in the River Inn, one of the principal rivers of the Danube, by the capsizing of a boat.

SARA'S "HAMLET" CAUSED A DUEL.

Paris, May 23.—A duel has been fought on the Isle De La Grande Gatte between Count de Des, the French author and dramatic critic, and M. Vanor. The quarrel which led to the meeting grew out of a discussion on Saturday last during an entre-acte, at the Theatre De La Place Du Chatelet, where Sara Bernhardt produced her version of "Hamlet" and played the title role in black costumes and with blonde hair. MM. Mendes and Vanor engaged in a dispute as to whether Hamlet should be fat or thin. This is Mendes' fourteenth duel. He is not a good fencer, but he walks towards his adversary waving his sword like a fan.

The encounter was stopped four times under the belief that Mendes was wounded, and the fifth time it was stopped found him with an ugly wound in the abdomen. Vanor obviously tried to wound Mendes in the hand or forearm, but the latter was determined to achieve a serious wound. M. Vanor expressed regret at the outcome of the encounter, but Mendes, who was placed in a chair, shook hands with his adversary and treated the affair lightly, though it was evident that he was suffering great pain. Madame Mendes, whose knowledge of her husband's band's knowledge and Vanor of the duel in a carriage near by. There was an affecting scene between the husband and wife when the fighting was finished.

SIR HENRY IRVING BETTER.

London, May 23.—Sir Henry Irving, who has been confined to his rooms with throat trouble, is out again, and will resume his representation of "Roberpierre" at the Lyceum Theater.

THE PARIS INJURIES.

Falmouth, May 22.—Later in the day a fair report that the Paris had sustained heavy damage from her bow to a point seventy feet aft. But he thought the principal damage was inside the double bottom.

WAZIRIS HAVE SUBMITTED.

Simla, May 23.—The recalcitrant Shabar section of the Kabukhel Waziris have come in and paid an installment of the fine imposed upon them. They have also expelled the outlaws, whom they had previously protected, and in consequence of their acts of submission the punitive column of troops which was sent against them have been withdrawn.

THE QUEEN'S EYESIGHT.

London, May 23.—Truth today, in spite of semi-official statements to the contrary, insists that an operation for cataract of the Queen's eyes is inevitable. It says: "The Queen has just consulted Prof. Hagenstecker, of Wiesbaden, who guarantees the success of the operation, and opines that the

Queen will entirely regain the excellent sight she possessed until recently.

COUNTRESS BEHIND THE COUNTER

London, May 23.—The Countess of Warwick, who recently created a sensation by floating the Warwick Estate Company (Limited), personally attended today the opening of her shop for the sale of school needlework in New Bond street, and served at the counter. Her appearance in this capacity caused great rush to the establishment.

DISTINGUISHED MEN HONORED.

London, May 23.—The Royal Institution of Great Britain, in commemoration of its centenary has elected as honorary members Prof. Samuel Pierpont Langley, astronomer, secretary of the Smithsonian Institute, Washington, D. C.; Prof. Albert Abraham Michelson, physicist, of Chicago; Prof. Henry Thurston, mechanical engineer, director of the Sibley College, of Cornell University; Prof. J. I. Ames, of Johns Hopkins University; Geo. Frederick Barker, physicist, professor of physics at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, and Prof. Wm. Lynne Wilson, ex-congressman, and formerly president of West Virginia University, and regent of the Smithsonian Institution.

WALLES' HORSE SALE

London, May 23.—The auction sale of the Prince of Wales' hackneys took place today at Wolferton, near Sandringham House, the seat of the Prince of Wales, in Norfolk, and was successful. There was a large attendance, including the Duke of York, the Duke of Marlborough, the Earl of Coventry, Lord Iveagh, Lord Marcus Beresford, Sir Edward Sassoon and Sir Thomas Lipton. The Prince of Wales presided at the luncheon, at which 1,200 persons were seated. The sale realized 1,650 guineas for a pair of bay geldings. There was keen competition between Sir Thomas Lipton, the Earl of Coventry and Sir Edgar Vincent for the chestnut gelding Coup de Grace, which was finally secured by Sir Edgar Vincent for 925 guineas. Sir Thomas Lipton subsequently bought a mare for 683 guineas. Altogether 66 horses were sold, and the total sum realized was upwards of 12,000 guineas.

THE STRANDED STEAMER.

Falmouth, England, May 23.—The weather continues favorable, the stranded ship. A light wind is blowing, and there is no serious amount of wash. Soundings, which have been taken, show the Paris to be resting on the ground, owing to the fact that she has been considerably lightened. An American Line official says there is little doubt that she will be successfully towed off. Powerful pumps, belonging to the Liverpool Salvage Association, are expected to arrive at the scene of the wreck this evening, and the divers believe the additional pumps will clear the first four holds. The fifth is so badly pierced that no amount of pumping will clear it. The remaining six holds are so badly damaged that they will be abandoned.

It is considered that the steamer, now being evenly balanced, will come off the rocks without sustaining further damage. The officers of the Paris still refuse to furnish any information of her getting out of the court by official of the board of trade boarded her for the purpose of obtaining some information on the subject, but her officers refused to answer any questions, on the ground that the British Board of Trade has no jurisdiction in the matter, and the inquiry into the disaster must take place in the United States, as the Paris is under the American flag.

A FLAG INCIDENT.

London, May 23.—Particulars have just been received in London regarding the incident of the hoisting of the British flag over Port Royall, Island of Palawan, of the Philippine group, by Captain Port, of the British steamer Labuan. He reports that he visited the island on Feb. 1 and found the people in a state of consternation. The Spaniards, it appears, had left there three months previously, after saying the Americans would take over the government in three days. The Spaniards, it added, turned the native soldiery adrift and liberated the convicts. The head man, it is further asserted, asked Capt. Port to secure protection from the governor of Samar, and the captain gave them a British merchant ensign, with instructions for the people to say if they were molested, that they were under British protection, also handing the head man a letter in this sense and claiming a British protectorate over Palawan. On reporting the matter to Sir Charles Mitchell, governor of the Straits Settlement, the latter communicated with the British foreign office, who cabled orders to Singapore to haul down the British flag. The British third-class cruiser Archer was dispatched to haul down the flag, the orders of the foreign office saying that Palawan and the adjacent islands being portions of the Philippine group, became, by virtue of conquest, American territory.

SEVEN MEN WERE LYNCHED

For the Alleged Crime of One Man—Mexican Regulators Do the Deed.

Cincinnati May 23.—A special to the Enquirer from Diaz, Mex., says: There is great excitement in the town of San Dialis, 10 miles from here, over the lynching of seven colored laborers on the Mexican Central Railroad.

Jos Santo, a Spanish negro, attempted to assault the wife of Senor Duply, a ranchowner, and escaping from the plantation, was tracked by bloodhounds in company with nine others, he was captured in a hut on the river bank opposite Eagle Pass. The regulators did not attempt to prove the guilt of any of the negroes, but hung three of them and shot four more who were attempting to escape.

The officials are swearing in deputies, as race trouble is threatened in the colored quarter. Four of the negroes killed were Americans and had all served sentences in the Texas penitentiary.

RUMORED FIGHT IN NICARAGUA DENIED.

Washington, May 23.—As the latest telegraphic and mail advices from American officials at Bluefields and other points in Nicaragua contained nothing to indicate any serious friction between the United States and Nicaraguan officials, Secretary Long

said that he was not inclined to credit the report that a United States ship had been called upon to resort to extreme measures. Secretary Hay also said that no word had been received at the state department on the subject, therefore, he was not prepared to believe that anything of the kind had occurred.

REDEEMED THE RIDING!

The Liberal Forces Capture North Waterloo

Dr. Lackner's Recent Majority of 65 Wiped Out.

Louis Brethaupt, of Berlin, Liberal Candidate, Elected by 118 Majority—The Figures.

Berlin, Ont., May 23.—This has been one of the hottest elections the riding of North Waterloo has ever witnessed, and a sigh of relief is expressive of the public mind that the contest is over. Probably never in its history, has there been such a fight, and it is doubtful if such a crowd ever gathered in Berlin as there was this evening when the Liberals, in celebrating, formed a torch-light procession, accompanied by the band, and marched up to Mr. L. J. Brethaupt's residence on Queen street, where they serenaded and cheered the newly-elected member until he responded, and delivered a speech, thanking them one and all for their labors in his behalf.

At the general election the result of the vote was: Lackner, 2,701; Clemens, 2,636; majority for Lackner, 65.

The election was made necessary by the unseating of Dr. Lackner on the usual charges of bribery and corruption.

PASSING OF PULLMAN CITY

Model Town Will Soon Cease to Exist.

Court Gives Five Years to Sell Outside Holdings—Including 1,200 Houses and 60 Acres of Streets.

Chicago, May 23.—The first decree in the quo warranto proceedings against the Pullman Palace Car Company has been entered in the circuit court by Judge Baker. By its terms the company has five years in which to dispose of its outside holdings, that period being considered by Attorney-General Akim, of Illinois, the "reasonable time provided for in the recent supreme court decision. The decree comprises 60 typewritten pages. By it Pullman's Palace Car Company has five years in which to dispose of the 1,200 residences in the model town, the 16 acres of vacant lots, the 60 acres of streets, alley and parks, the gas, water, and sewerage works, the Hotel Florence, two churches, the theater, the arcade building and the market hall.

One year is given to cease to exercise all municipal functions—the operating of water, gas, steam and sewerage plants. Within one year also it must dispose of the Pullman Iron and Steel Company. The company will retain its car shops and surrounding 110 acres of ground, office building at Michigan avenue and Adams street, 25 acres of land on the belt railroad and 65 acres north of Pullman, held for extension purposes.

The company no longer owns the brickyard, the Southern Palace Car Company, the Union Foundry and Wheel Company and 175 acres of land near Lake Calumet. The land south of Pullman was disposed of last summer to a syndicate which has plans for the erection of industrial concerns thereon.
