### **NEW YORK EXTENDS** TYPICAL AMERICAN **WELCOME TO PRINCE**

Dense Crowds Cheer Heir To British Throne.

ENTERED AT BATTERY Party Stepped From Battle-

ship To Barges To Cross

PRINCE ATTENDS OPERA. NEW YORK, Nov. 18-One of the most brilliant scenes that the Metropolitan Opera House has witnessed was presented tonight at the gala performance given in honor of the Prince of Wales. The great audience, which filled the house, overflowed into the airles until every

available bit of standing room was occupied.
When the prince, accompanied by Viscount Grey, the British ambas sador, entered his box in the centre of the horseshoe at 10:15, he re-ceived a remarkable ovation. The vast audience rose to its feet, and, turning its back to the stage, applauded for three minutes. The young prince seemed almost embarrassed by the warmth of his reception, but the applause continued until the voice of Caruso, singing a selection from "I'Pagliacci," rose above it.

The program consisted of selections from various operas and concluded with a ballet. As the prince left the house he was the reciplent of another enthusiastic ovation, which was continued in Broadway, where, in spite of the fact that it was nearly midnight, a large crowd had gathered for a glimpse of the British prince.

· NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—(By F. G. In the corresponding week in 1918 the receipts were 13,673,000 bushels. Production of flour for the week totalled 3,209,000 barrels, a decrease from the previous week of 131,000 barrels, but an increase over the corresponding week of last year of 1,015,000.

#### BULGARIAN TREATY TO BE SIGNED ON NOV. 27

### PARTY LEADERS IN U.S. SENATE TO COMPROMISE

Democrats To Have Chance For Vote on Unreserved Ratification.

Friends of Treaty Believe It Has an Even Chance For Life.

WASHINGTON, D.C.. Nov. 18.— At 10:15 o'clock tonight the vice-president declared the treaty closed to further reservation or amend-ments and the Senate adjourned until noon tomorrow, when the until noon tomorrow, when the ratification resolution will be taken

WASHINGTON. D. C., Nov. 18.

Compromise moves to rescue the peace treaty from a threatened deadlock made such progress today that its friends declared it had more than an even chance for life.

So far as it had taken definite form tonight the program called for a final vote Thursday and pointed toward acceptance of reservations of the foreign relations committee without the requirement that they must be assented to affirmatively by the other powers.

The way to compromise was opened by the group of mild reservation Republicans, who served notice on the Republican and Democratic leaders that they would not put up the bars entirely to modification of the committee reservations, but would stand out against and defeat the administration's parliamentary program. Compromise moves to rescue the pear parliamentary program.

Cards on Table.

With this final announcement of how

their deciding strength would be used in the closing stages of the treaty contest, the mild reservationists retired to the background. The result was that Republican Leader Lodge and Democratic Leader Hitchcock faced each other and loid all their condensations. ther and laid all their cards on the

other and laid all their cards on the table.

The conference between the two leaders brought no final decision as to the language of a compromise ratification, but it did develop an agreement that the Democrats would have the opportunity for which they had fought to secure a showdown vote on the question of unreserved ratification.

This vote, Mr. Lodge said, would be permitted before the roll call on the committee resolution.

Lodge Insistent.

Another result of the conference was submission to Mr. Lodge tonight of a group of proposed compromise reserva-

group of proposed compromise reserva-tions with a view to making enough modification in the committee program already approved by the Senate major-ity to enable the Democrats to support the committee resolution on ratifica-tion. On this point Senator Lodge was said to be insistent, as he desired all compromise efforts to be made before the vote came on the committee meas-

the vote came on the committee measure.

Meantime in the Senate two more reservations were added to the thirteen already adopted. The mild reservationists supported them as the final qualifications which they would help to write into the treaty, but the Senate extended its session far into the evening, voting down numerous other proposals in an effort to clear the way before adjournment for work tomorrow on the ratification resolution itself.

The two reservations adopted today related to the labor provision in Part Thirteen of the treaty and to voting equality in the league of nations. They equality in the league of nations. They foliow:

foliow:

The Reservations.

"The United States withholds its assent to Part XIII (Articles 387 to 427 inclusive) of said treaty unless Congress, by act or joint resolution, shall hereafter make provision for representation in the organization established by said Part XIII., and in such event the participation of the United States will be governed and conditioned by the provisions of such act or joint resolution.

by the provisions of such act or joint resolution.

"The United States assumes no obligation to be bound by any election, decision, report or finding of the council or assembly in which any member of the league and its self-governing dominions, colonies or parts of empire, in the aggregate, have cast more than one vote, and assumes no obligation to be bound by any decision, report or finding of the council or assembly arising out of any dispute between the United States and any member of the league if such member, or any self-governing dominion, colony, empire or part of empire united with it politically has voted."
