SAY THEY WERE USED ROUGHLY

Border Residents Wire Attorney-General Regarding Rev. Arthur Spracklin.

[By Staff Reporter.] WINDSOR, Nov. 15.—Protesting vigorously against the actions of Rev. Arthur Spracklin, special license officer on the border, and brother of Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, and one of his aides, in assaulting them, Ex-Reeve C. C. Chavira of Sandwich West and W. J. Mossing, manager of the Postum Cereal Company, Windsor, today wired details to Attorney-General Raney.

"Responsibility for any further killings in this district," the telegram declared, "is up to you."

The two men, both well-known border residents, were returning in their automobile to Windsor after a drive on business into the county, when they were halted by two officers and ordered to alight from their car to permit a search for contraband liquor.

When they protested and questioned the right of the officers to search their car, Messenger, it is alleged, was handled roughly and handcuffed by Spracklin, while Ex-Reeve Chavira, who was suffering from a carbuncle on his arm, was seized roughly and held by the other officer, it is said.

When the search for whiskey proved fruitless the men were released.

In filing their complaint with the attorney-general, Messenger and Chavira declared they intended seeking legal redress through the courts. They claim both officers flourished revolvers.

MUST MAKE CHARGES.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—Investigation of the administration of justice in the city of Windsor will not be undertaken unless and until specific charges are made in writing, Attorney-General Raney stated today. So far no such charges have been made, but it is understood a Windsor solicitor has been retained to prepare particulars to formulate certain charges.

MEIGHEN WANTS TO SPEAK BEFORE ELECTION COMES

Premier Willing To Go To Country After Propaganda Is Done.

DISCUSSES TARIFF

People Must Wait To Hear Government "Case" Before Getting Vote.

BRANDON, Man., Nov. 15.—(By Canadian Press.)—Premier Meighen and Hon. J. A. Calder addressed two meetings held here tonight with a total attendance of probably thirteen hundred persons. There was no large hall available and people packed the city hall auditorium and overflowed to the Prince Edward Hotel.

Meighen, speaking first at the main meeting, said that until recently the Government had been too busy to explain its position.

"We stand on the job," he said, "most day and night, and while we did not conduct Canada perfectly, we are not ashamed of our record. We have sought to get results for the country rather than for political parties."

Would Talk First.

"We hear talk that we should have an election. Those who talk that way know time is on our side; they know we are just now beginning to lay our case before the people and the people are going to have time to hear it. They try to make out that we are a war government with a war spirit, and that with the election should go to the people. Well, the Government elected in 1911 was a peace government, and when the war came did they say we should go to the country? We'll go to the country, but we will take the truth goes to the country first."

The premier devoted most of his speech to discussion of the tariff.

"I believe," he said, "in the protective principle, but you can overdo the protective principle, nothing easier, and it takes a strong leader and government to avoid doing so. In this country it is particularly necessary to avoid overdoing it."

Maintain Industries.

"We cannot maintain our industries in this country in any substantial state unless we follow the protective tariff, but I would follow only to the extent of keeping Canadian industries in this country. We should seek such a level as is reasonable and fair."

Meighen said the West did not enjoy the advantages of protection to the same direct degree as Eastern Canada, and therefore, it is necessary that the tariff should be kept at the lowest level which would maintain the integrity of the Dominion.

The prime minister declared that even if the United States threw down all tariff bars he would not favor doing the same, because for one reason, there could be no assurance that their policy would not be altered at another election. "We can't," he said, "set down the barriers. While we retain our industrial independence as a nation, it would be most obvious to the plainest man that we must take up free trade. Nothing would be more fatal to our industrial structure."

"I believe," said Mr. Meighen, "in outside competition as a basis of protection. The tariff is not to be put up a tariff wall which will make Canada a haven of idleness and ease and rest for those making goods in this country. It is up to you to say."

The prime minister gave "the installment" of the member for McEwen (C. Henderson), much credit for the reduction in tariff on agricultural implements during recent years.

RANEY PROMISES TO ENFORCE ACT

Municipalities Ask For Action in Reference To Natural Gas.

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—Hon. W. E. Raneay today waited on by Mayor Briscoe of Chatham, Mayor Winter of Windsor, and R. L. Brackin, M.P.P. of Windsor, who were seeking action for enforcement of the regulation of the natural gas act. The attorney-general promised that the Government would enforce the act.

The reputation said municipalities paying a lighter rate received the most favorable treatment.

DEMAND A PROBE.

INGERSOLL, Nov. 15.—Following repeated protests against the raising of the price of natural gas locally from 45 cents to 55 cents, the following resolution moved by Councillor Gibson, and seconded by Councillor Scott, was unanimously passed at tonight's meeting of the council:

"That this council request the Ontario Government through the premier and his cabinet to appoint a commission to investigate the gas situation, to keep as a separate account the difference between 55 cents and 45 cents, and that the account be absolutely separate and distinct, and if after investigation by the commission they find it is not necessary to charge 55 cents that this council would ask that the amount be refunded to Ingersoll consumers."

Members of the council, speaking in connection with the matter, said there was a good deal of room for doubt as to the necessity of the company making such a large jump in the price.

Copies of the resolution will be sent to Hon. Henry Mills and to Premier Drury.

WANT IT SETTLED.

WINDSOR, Nov. 15.—With the object of settling finally whether the producing gas companies in Ontario shall have the right to discriminate against municipalities adhering to their franchises and refusing higher rates to companies, Mayor Winter and Ald. Urquhart of Windsor, accompanied by Mayor Briscoe of Chatham, and R. L. Brackin, solicitor for the Municipal Gas Consumers' Association, interviewed Premier Drury in Toronto this afternoon.

With the pressure in the border mains at a minimum last week, and other little improvement today, Mayor Winter voiced his conviction to Gas Commission that the situation was not satisfactory and that Sarnia and other centres in the province that have agreed to an advance in rates are securing benefit.

Upon being informed by the commission that his suspicions were probably correct, the mayor immediately got in touch with Mayor Briscoe of Chatham, and Barrister Brackin, and arranged for the meeting with Premier Drury to have this point settled definitely.

METHODIST PASTORS PAY-ROLL GOES UP

TORONTO, Nov. 15.—Through the campaign carried on by the Dominion ministerial support committee of the Methodist Church under the chairmanship of A. E. Ames of this city, \$397,835 has been added to the annual payroll of the Methodist pastors in Canada and Newfoundland. The payroll for 1920-21 totalled \$1,905,739, whereas for 1919-20 the sum is \$2,303,424. Announcement of the success of the campaign was made here today by Secretary Denzil G. Ridout.

Tells Bakers To Cut

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Chicago bakers were summoned to the city hall today by Russell Poole, secretary of the councils' high cost of living committee, and urged to reduce the price of bread from 15 cents for a pound loaf to 10 cents.

Unless the request is complied with, Mr. Poole told the bakers, the city council would launch a campaign advising housewives to resume home baking until the price comes down.

BLAME CANADIAN WHEAT FOR LACK OF PRODUCTION

Kansas Millers Say They Cannot Compete With Northern Plants.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 15.—Officials of Topeka flour mills, testifying today before the Kansas court of industrial relations on a citation to show why they have limited production of flour without first obtaining permission provided by the industrial court act, said they have partly shut down because of a lack of demand for Kansas flour. This is due, they said, to the fact that northwestern mills, by using their cheaper Canadian wheat, are able to sell flour for about \$1 a barrel less.

The price of flour has decreased since September 1, from about \$2.50 to \$3.50 a barrel, testified P. Gramer, president of the Topeka Flour Mills Company.

"We are operating now at two-thirds capacity," he said.

It was brought out that the total quantity of flour milled in Kansas is about 10 times that consumed in the state, and that the millers depend largely on the eastern market to take their surplus production.

PAID \$130 FOR RIVER WATER

Haunted House Mystery At Port Lambton Has A Peculiar Solution.

PORT LAMBTON, Nov. 15.—The story of the haunted house was revived here, when a light was observed in a vacant house at the corner of Front street and Broadway between 12 and 1 o'clock. The light was seen for a couple of nights, and for a time those who saw it thought there was a fire in the house, as it flickered considerably and vanished only to reappear again soon.

The matter was reported to Scott McDonald, who is in charge of the property. On investigating he found the door locked, but downstairs noticed that a coat which had been hanging on the door was missing. On going upstairs he noticed a leather suitcase on the floor, and on stepping into a room he noticed two men lying on the floor in the corner covered up with old clothing and magazines. He did not report the matter to the police, but kept watch on the house. No one came out during the day, but at about two men slipped out and went to the Victoria Hotel, where they had supper. One was identified as a man named White, who was here some time ago, but beat a hasty retreat, when four officers suddenly appeared in search of bootleggers.

White and his pal, who is unknown here, apparently fulfilled their mission this time as on Thursday night. It is learned they sold and delivered to a party across the border two cases supposed to contain whiskey, but when opened were found to contain perfectly good St. Clair River water, for which the pair used this to get across the river.

COAL AND SUGAR PRICES BOTH SLIP

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 15.—Coal prices have dropped in Fredericton one dealer announcing this morning that he was now selling anthracite at \$20 per ton, delivered. Former prices ranged up to \$25 per ton.

SUGAR AT TEN CENTS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Several companies operating chain stores in the lower west side offered sugar at 10 cents a pound this morning, but stores in other districts continued to quote it all the way from 11 cents to 16 cents. Wholesale quotations were unchanged at 10 cents to 10 1/2 cents per pound.

APPLES IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—(Canadian Press.)—The latest prices for Canadian apples are: Ribstones, No. 1, 50 to 52 1/2 shillings; do, No. 2, 40 to 45 shillings; Blenheim, No. 1, 50 to 52 1/2 shillings; do, No. 2, 40 to 42 1/2 shillings; Kings, 55 to 60 shillings.

SCHOOL FOR WIFE

BENTON, Ill., Nov. 15.—Mrs. Clyde Billington, fifteen-year-old housewife of Rockford, an small village near here, has been ordered to go to school. The law provides that a wife must attend school unless they have completed the eighth grade. Mrs. Billington will be 16 next April. She has not completed the eighth grade.

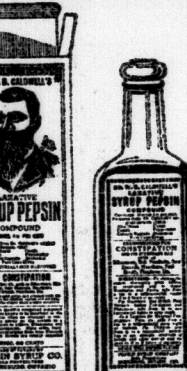
Police Are Searching For Shipping Point of Whiskey Ring.

SARNIA, Nov. 15.—Provincial officers and liquor sleuths are working on the latest Lambton liquor soup tonight, and a guard has been thrown along the St. Clair River, from Port Lambton to Sarnia, in an effort to discover the point where huge quantities of alcoholic liquors are being shipped to the United States by an organized whiskey ring, reported to have commenced activities here since the old was clamped on tight at Windsor.

LINER IS DELAYED.

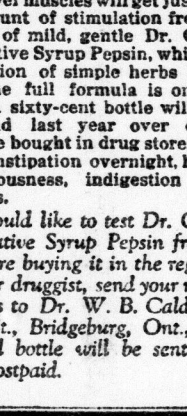
