Made Major-General by Militia Council—Col. F. Marlow Appointed Chief Med. Inspector.

DUKE TO VISIT CAMP

Twenty-Seven Battalions Will Take Part in Great Sham Fight at Borden.

CAMP BORDEN, Ont., Aug. 16—

Brig.-General W. A. Logie, commandant of military district No. 2 (Toronto), and Camp Borden, has been promoted to rank of major-general, by the militia council, Ottawa.

Col. F. W. Marlow, director of medical services for the Toronto military district, has been appointed chief medical inspector of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in Canada.

The appointment is for the purpose of his making a report on medical matters in the various military districts of the Dominion. He will likely continue to make Toronto his headquarters.

Lieut. A. F. Conventry, district intelligence officer, has been raised to rank of captain.

The militia department informed headquarters here today that His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and Princess Patricia, would come to camp Borden on Monday, September 4. It is stated that the duke will inspect the troops on his brigades marches and that there will be a march past on the ceremonial area.

Big Sham Fight.

Twenty-seven battalions will take part in the manoeuvres areas on Camp Borden tomorrow, tomorrow night and on Friday. On Thursday night the soldiers will bivouac in the open instead of returning to their tents area.

One force will be known as southern force and will be commanded by Lieut.-Col. S. Wigle.

The other force, the northern, will be directed by Lieut.-Col. W. C. McDonald. The northland is supposed to consist of the districts of Nipissing, Sudbury, Algoma, Thunder Bay and Manitowish.

The southern force will have Toronto, as its hospital and consist of Simcoe, Grey, Dufferin, Wellington, Peel, York and Halton Counties.

The northern and army will assume the offensive. Both forces will consist of four infantry brigades with artillery support.

All the manoeuvres will be confined to government property within the camp.

Must Have Health Certificates.

Before battalions leave for overseas the certificates in triplicate, must be rendered, signed by the commander and examining medical officer, showing that each member of the unit is medically fit for overseas service, and neither under nor over age. One copy of this certificate will be retained by the commander of the battalion for production on entry in England.

A special room for the sending and receiving of "wireless" messages will be installed in the district headquarters office building.

The wireless apparatus will be much more powerful than the first set erected in camp.

Second Building Nearly Finished.

The second building has been shown in the progress of construction. It is only about ten days' work on it commenced, and it is expected to be completed in about a month. The building will house part of the general staff offices and the paymaster's department.

The 142nd and 138th Battalions were inspected in masonry work at the camp Borden, next Wednesday.

Applications of officers wishing to take the course must reach district headquarters here by noon Monday.

A board of officers with Major F. F. H. McCarthy of the 17th Middlesex as president, will examine officers in the district office on Friday.

Officers eligible to attend the examination are those qualifying for field rank at the school of infantry, and those who have passed field officers' examinations, but are not qualified in equitation.

Sgt.-Major A. E. Brittan, P.C.L.I., will be sergeant-major of the first brigade, in the district bombing school, Camp Borden.


