A grant of \$30 was made toward the enlargement of the Parish Church in Granville.

Also \$50 toward paying the debt upon the Parsonage at Kentville on

condition of \$400 from the people within two years.

A statement was submitted shewing that the back interest on the Tennessee State Bonds had been paid by a new Bond, and that the interest upon the whole would in future be paid half yearly as usual.

It was agreed that the resolution passed Nov. 1865, relative to a grant

of £40 stg. from the Block Sum to Tusket be acted upon.

The following resolution was adopted:

"That the Investment Committee be instructed to embrace every favorable opportunity for converting the amount now held under Bond and Mortgage, on account of this Society, into public securities; the Committee being of opinion that such securities are more desirable investments for its funds than bond and mortgage."

DEC. 21st, 1866.—A grant of \$80 was made toward building a Par-

sonage at Three Fathom Harbor, Dartmouth.

A grant of \$120 each was made to two clergymen, lately arrived from England, as an outfit, it being understood that the money was to meet the expenditure for their passage money advanced by the S. P. G.

With regard to the desired information as to the transfer of the Block Sum of S. P. G. to D. C. S., the Bishop gave the following extract from a letter of the Secretary S. P. G., dated Nov. 24, 1866.

"With reference to the administration of the Block Grant, which was advised in my letter dated 13th July, 1865, I am directed to say:

(1.) "That the usual rule is that a grant is made to a person at a place; the place having no vested right in the continuance of the grant, which may be varied; nor the person if he removes to another place.

(2.) "So far as we can ascertain, the Very Rev. W. Bullock alone appears entitled to the Society's grant for life. If any other clergyman

makes a claim it must be considered.

(3.) "The sum granted in 1840 stands now on the same footing as the rest of the Block Grant; and when any part of the grant of 1840 falls in, it becomes part of the Block, and is administered exactly as any other part."
