

The Lord Provost of Glasgow in the course of an address on the progress of the temperance question in Scotland before the Scottish Temperance League, said, "The intemperance is beginning to be driven from our midst by the wisdom of our people, our sense of our fanaticism, and although by many our safe and simple remedy for the evil itself is recognized and decried, and every one, from the highest statesman to the humblest working-class politician, is ready to say something must be done."

The story of the treachery of Kara by Russia is a commanding one. The statement is that two paschas having subordinate commands in the beleaguered city betrayed the Russian by letting the Russians become aware of the movement; that the paschas contracted to be prisoners, and that they afterwards refused to be exchanged, in order to escape trial and punishment for their treachery. The full particulars of the capture of Kara have not yet been received.

PHOTOGRAPHING IN COLORS.—From time to time announcements have been made of the discovery of methods for photographing in natural colors, but nothing satisfactory is reported. Some of the more promising efforts were made a few years ago with the very sensitive salts of uranium. A report was claimed that colored pictures were obtained, the colors themselves were said to be fugitive. A report comes from Munich, Bavaria, that colored pictures have been produced by a new process. Three photographs are taken. The first is on a plate which is sensitive to yellow rays only; the second is on a plate sensitive to blue rays, and the printing from this is with blue ink, overlying the first printing. The third photograph is of red, and the proceedings are similar with red ink. The colors thus blended in printing are said to give the natural tints. It is possible that success may ultimately attend experiments of this character, but it seems highly improbable that plates can be prepared which will photograph red, yellow or blue separately.

MOUNT ALLISON'S NEW PRESIDENT.—From private advices received from Sacramento this morning we learn that at a meeting of the Board of Governors held yesterday, the Rev. Howard Sprague, M. A., of this city, was elected to succeed Mr. Allison, President of Mount Allison College. Mr. Sprague is only thirty-four years old, graduating at Sacramento in 1868, but since then has been holding important positions in connection with the Methodist Church. He enjoys more than a Provincial reputation as an orator, and will lead dignity and prestige in his new position. As a student, he excelled in classics. His later efforts, and study, judging from his public efforts, have been of a broad and liberal kind. His election was hailed with exceeding popularity with the Alumni of the Institution. We heartily congratulate him on his election, and the Board of Governors on the choice they have made.—St. John Globe.

DROWNED NEAR GRAND MANAN.—Mr. Oliver W. Green was drowned Dec. 16th, while crossing from Grand Manan, Grand Manan, to Cheneville Island in his own sail boat. His daughter, a young woman, was with him at the time of the fatal accident. It being quite calm, Mr. Green was taking the reefs out of his sail, and in so doing his footing, fell forward. His daughter says he went for the little boat he had in tow for a few minutes, and then went for her light. Her cries were heard by persons on the shore, who hurried to save him, but were too late. His body was recovered the same evening, and carried home to his residence, and was buried in the afternoon. He leaves a wife, five sons and three daughters, and many relatives, to mourn their loss. The funeral was largely attended.—Intelligencer.

MILITARY.—There are to be no changes of troops between North America and the West Indies in consequence of the departure of the 1st Battalion 19th Regiment. Colonel Deane has orders to keep his battalion in readiness to embark at Portsmouth on Monday week, and it will go to Bermuda, where it will perform the duties of the 8th Fusiliers, ordered to England. Halifax, N. S., is to continue to be garrisoned by the 1st Battalion 20th and 97th, the 46th continuing at Bermuda, and the 35th at Barbadoes. Next year it is thought there may be some changes.—Army and Navy Gazette, Oct. 27.

TRURO, Dec. 19.—The Reform Club is still progressing rapidly in the temperance cause. Organized and enthusiastic meetings are held tri-weekly. Converts are being added to the roll at the rate of 50 per week. The total number enrolled under the reform pledge here is 1,700, with branches organized by the clubs at Londonderry, Great Village, Brookfield, Riverside, North River, Harmony, and Waterville, in Pictou County, with a total membership of nearly 1200.—Chronicle.

The effects of the mild weather upon trees of different descriptions at present is very remarkable. A correspondent from Theford, Ont., writing on the 19th inst., says: "The weather has been so very mild as to cause new leaves to come out on some of my apple trees—some of them one and a quarter inches long. The catkins are out on the weeping willows, and the daisies are in full bloom."—Montreal Free Press.

THE IMPORTATIONS OF DEALS AT LIVERPOOL, ENGLAND, FROM ST. JOHN, N. B., FROM JAN. 20TH TO DEC. 1ST, 1877.—Amounted to 7,723,498 pieces against 2,984,577 pieces in 1876; and 5,525,353 in 1875.
