N. B. POSTMASTERS FORM ASSOCIATION

Thirty-five Organized at Moncton Yesterday — Want More Pay Among Other Things House Damaged By Fire.

Moncton, N.B., Feb. 20.—(Special)—Fire occurred this evening in the wooden building owned by William Somers, near Main street, railway crossing, doing \$300 or \$500 damage in the second and third stories occupied by Mr. Somers as a residence, where the fire started. The principal damage was done by water. The shop on the ground floor occupied by Blair Bellamy as a saloon also sustained slight damage from water. The loss is covered by insurance.

A Postmasters' Association for New Brunswick was organized here this afternoon by Mrs. Stratton, of Stonewall (Man.), editor of the "Postal Current". Quite a number of postmasters present from different stations, and the organization starts with a membership of thirty-five. It is expected to increase this number to two or three hundred very soon. The object of the association is to better conditions under which postmasters labor. The postmasters, it is considered, are poorly paid officials, and one of the objects will be to petition the postal department for greater remuneration; also to suggest improvements that will increase the efficiency of the postal service. Officers were elected as follows:

A. J. M. Kinnear, Somers, president; A. P. Hartman, Newville, vice-president; J. V. Bourque, Shediac, secretary-treasurer; executive committee—Father Cormier, St. Joseph; G. H. Second, Upperhaque; G. T. Stevens, Hillsboro; D. S. Mann, Pettitodas. Delegation to Ottawa to interview the postmaster general in addition to the chief officers of organization—Father Cormier and J. V. Bourque. The delegation will shortly go to Ottawa to lay before the department suggestions for the betterment of the service and petition for increased remuneration. Organizer Stratton has been in Ontario and goes from here to Nova Scotia to organize an association for that province.

HOW FORCE OF LIFE COMPANY DUPED VICTIMS

Remedies Sent Out All Taken from the Same Barrel, and Consisted of Water Only.

New York, Feb. 20.—The method of sending Force of Life remedy to patients was taken up today at the hearing of the charge against the Force of Life Chemical Company of conspiracy to defraud through use of the mails. Mrs. Nellie U. Wallington, who was employed by the Force of Life Chemical Company, predecessor of the company now being examined, was recalled to the witness stand.

She was asked by Assistant U. S. District Attorney Houghton whether she knew anything about the Force of Life remedies, and replied that the liquid medicine was taken from the Force of Life barrel, which she said she was inclined to believe contained water. The liquid remedy was supposed to have four strings, she testified, and when taken from the barrel the bottles after being filled were labelled accordingly. A boy did up the bottles after taking the remedy from the Force of Life barrel, the witness said, and then they were turned over to young woman, who was called to the witness stand.

"When persons sent for samples of the Force of Life medicine what did they receive?" asked Mr. Houghton.

"They all received what was known as 'dope,'" replied Mrs. Wallington.

Some of the company's index cards, on which were kept records of individual patients, were put in evidence and Mr. Houghton asked what the black marks which appeared in some cases after the words "Money refunded." The witness said that it meant that the patient did not get any money back. The defence objected to this testimony and the objection was sustained. Mrs. Wallington was still on the stand when the hearing adjourned until next Monday.

BLISS CARMAN'S WOES

Bangor Poet Tells, and Well He Knows the Grief He Spells.

Bliss Carman is a poet true who writes in limpid rhyme, yes, he can make a madrigal or lay 'most any time. And when he needs a suit of clothes, a dinner or a trip, he harnesses his Muse and chuckle and lets her rip. And printing folks, in just a flash, they turn his lyrics into cash.

A modern poet has his needs, and many a need has he; he cannot live on violets nor yet reception tea. The fire divine must fuel have and lamb chops, sonnet make; and many a gentle roundelay's engendered by a steak. For when the Muse's nose is blue and when her blood is chill, her spondee and her dactyls come a-tripping mighty ill.

You see, this way the system works: "Pegasus makes the dough; the dough it makes the food and heat to make Pegasus go. But when Pegasus hales or bails, as happens like as not, the poet and the system then they both must go to pot. And such a sudden halt as this, it struck the lyric muse of Bliss.

Now, Stone he is a barrier who works in Montreal. He has no ear for rhyme, verse, no poet soul at all. But midst his dreary legal briefs and dull receipts for rent, this lawyer held the poet's note, a drawing eight per cent. And on the cheerless, songless day, he soaked him in the legal way.

B. Carman holds no means nor lands except in Acadia; his mansions are in fairyland; no stocks and bonds has he. His workshop is the April air, the Muse his stock in trade his wares are sweet hexameters by clin fingers made. So when Judge Conlon took the bench and let his logic flow, at first his mind could not devise a way to raise the dough. Pegasus is a bashful steed who loves for poets true, but halts and bucks, and will not pull for folks like me and you. But at once his legal mind devised a scheme to raise the wind.

He said, "To seize the lyric Muse would madness me or worse. Pegasus has no legal price, so let's attach the verse. This court appoints a just but stern receiver for this bard, whose daily task shall be to grab his rhymes and work him hard. So shall the debt be paid and justice satisfied—text case!"

Now no one yet may know who will the stern receiver be—a banker or a clerk perchance, perchance a notary. Perhaps a man who deals in hides, perhaps a drummer gay; but this is sure, the Court

will choose no poet, anyway. And every morn at half-past 9 he'll knock at Carman's door and seize the rhyme he has in stock and count their value o'er. Three dollars for a madrigal, a sonnet little more, a ballad—hey they are cheap these days—a dollar sixty-four. So shall he bend the poet's pride, and so the law be satisfied. You'd scarce expect a metre true from common mutts like us. Pronounce the work Pegasus; the right way's Pegasus.

Rev. J. W. Turner.

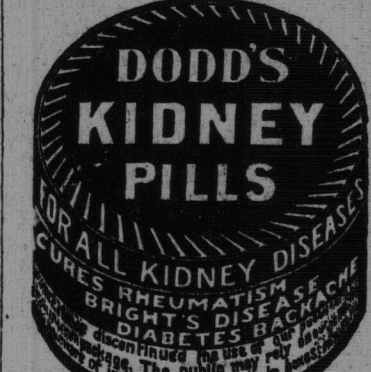
Halifax, Feb. 20.—Rev. J. W. Turner, who was stricken with paralysis at Kentville a week ago, died at an early hour this morning.

Halifax, Feb. 20.—(Special)—The inquest into the Stetka tragedy brought out nothing to confirm any of the theories so far advanced regarding a criminal motive. The autopsy, which was held yesterday by Dr. McCrean and Mr. Phillips, that there is no evidence to show that the children were murdered. The doctors say that the tracks in the skull may have been caused by contact with a hot wire, say with a wire mattress, and they expressed their opinion that the infants were suffocated.
