## IRELAND.

The Duke of Northumberland's government is deservedly very popular. Its chief characteristics are moderation and decided impartiality. The Ultra Aristocrats have been a little twitted at the number of Catholics who were at the last private ball and supper, where special invitations were necessary. Some of their mightiness took it in high dudgeon that the family of the prime agitator—the arch rebel—should be amongst the special guests to partake of vice-regal hospitality. The times are changed indeed;—such an offence against the high powers would once have been the signal for a general retreat.

Among the *audits* of the day it is said that Sir Anthony Hart is to be recalled from the Chancery of Ireland—Lord Plunket to take his place. Mr. Blake, the Chief Remembrancer of the Court of Exchequer, is to be Chief Justice of the Common Pleas. The Attorney-General to be Chief Baron of the Exchequer, in the place of Lord Rockingham, who retires from the Bench. Mr. Doherty to be Attorney-General, and Mr. Wallace Solicitor-General. We have also been informed that Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. is to be created a Peer of the United Kingdom, under the title of Baron Dromoland, of Dromoland, in the county of Clare.—*Dublin Morning Post*.

Lord Rossmore, protests against disfranchisement of the forty-shilling freeholders, Protestant as well as Catholic, amongst other grounds, because,

"That he apprehends the disfranchisement of the Protestant and Catholic forty-shilling freeholders in Ireland, will be attended with great discontent amongst that body. And that it will create a reaction not anticipated by the Right Honourable mover of the Bill, inasmuch as it will gradually dispossess an immense, industrious, and well-inclined population of their farms, and turn them drift on the high roads, and increase tenfold the inundation of an unemployed starving multitude on the shores of England and Scotland."

**HARE THE MURDERER.**—On Friday evening last, Hare, the murderer, called at a public house in Scarva, accompanied by his wife and child, and having ordered a mug of whisky, he began to enquire for the welfare of every member of the family of the house, with well-affected solicitude. However, as Hare is a native of this neighbourhood, he was soon recognised, and ordered to leave the place immediately, with which he complied. He took the road towards Loughbrickilly and followed by a number of boys, yelling and threatening in such a manner as obliged him to take to the fields, with such speed, that he soon disappeared, whilst his unfortunate wife remained on the road, imploring forgiveness, and denying in the most solemn manner, any participation in the crimes of her wretched husband. They now reside at the house of an uncle of Hare's, near Loughbrickilly.—*Belfast Paper*.

At Tralee Asizes, the glorious uncertainty of the law may be elicited from one fact. A man named Daly was indicted for stealing eight sheep; his guilt was undeniable, but a witness came up for the defence, to swear that two of the eight sheep were rams. On this legislative fiction, the accused was acquitted.—*Dublin P.*

The Asizes for Cork have terminated, and for several years, we do not recollect such a number of heavy cases as were disposed of. There were no less than seven capital convictions; and thirty-one males and seven females ordered for transportation.—*Lim'k pap.*

The constabulary of Ireland is now 5754 men, including 222 chief constables. The force is supported at an annual cost of £235,224.

According to a Parliamentary paper, the total number of prisoners committed for debt in the several prisons in the city of Dublin in the year 1827, was 2038—the number in custody in the same prisons in the year 1828, was 1811. The number of debtors in custody in those prisons on the 1st of January, 1829, was 184.—The number of prisoners committed for debt in the year 1828, to all the other prisons in Ireland, was 3,613, the number in custody on the 1st of January, 1829, in those prisons was 410. The total amount of the expenses of all the gaols in Ireland, in the year 1828, was £61,099 2s. 10d.

There died in Cork, a few days since, near the Old Barracks, W. Yates, pensioner, at the advanced age of 96 years. He enlisted in the year 1755, in the 29th regiment; was at the taking of Quebec, under General Wolfe; was at the taking of the Havana; and was also in the different battles that were fought during the American war. In 1783 he was discharged on a pension, which was subsequently increased, and in consequence of his being such an old veteran, and it is believed, the last of the survivors of the brave men who distinguished themselves under the immortal Wolfe, it was offered to be still further augmented; but he declined, alleging that his sovereign was already sufficiently bountiful to him.—*Limerick Chronicle*.

## UNITED STATES.

**NEW-YORK.**—Notwithstanding the momentary pressure, there is a wonderful movement in the city of New-York; the observer sees every indication of abundant and increasing prosperity; with so much wealth already accumulated, so much intelligence and enterprise, so many advantages for trade, so many attractions as a place of residence; it cannot fail to become one of the richest and noblest capitals in the world. A stranger is struck with admiration and delight every time he views the magnificent port, and the two great rivers, where the genius of commerce seems to triumph as on the most favored and commodious theatre. The prospects at noon and at the setting of the sun, from Castle Garden for instance, or the middle of the water scene, surpass in general effect any of the kind in Europe. Such a combination of beautiful imagery followed by the impressions received from the elegance and bustle of Broadway, and a consideration of the unceasing activity of mind and spirit, as well as for charitable and scientific purposes as for those of common livelihood, must refresh and dilate every warm imagination and gratify every liberal heart.—*Philadelphia paper*.

Two hundred and twenty temperance societies exist in the United States at the present time, whose titles and locations are known. Of these, four are State societies, besides the Massachusetts society, viz: those of New Hampshire, Vermont and Illinois. Of the others, 13 are in Maine, 23 in New Hampshire, 7 in Vermont, 39 in Massachusetts, 2 in Rhode Island, 33 in Connecticut, 78 in New-York, 6 in New Jersey, 7 in Pennsylvania, 5 in Virginia, and a few in several other states. Besides these, many more are known to be in existence. In Montreal a society was formed the past year, for Lower-Canada.

**Philadelphia, May 13th.**—On the arrival of the great and glorious news of seven millions of people being restored to the rights and privileges of freemen and to the benefits of the British constitution, our amiable and worthy mayor immediately made the necessary request that Christ Church bells should be rung during yesterday; and likewise ordered the old bell which first proclaimed the independence of these United-States, to ring during the whole day.

## COLONIAL.

**DISASTROUS ACCIDENT.**—On Thursday, four Midshipmen of the *Hosier* went into the woods at Dartmouth to amuse themselves at gunning. On one of the young gentlemen firing his piece it burst, shattering dreadfully his right hand, and wounding another in the leg who stood at some distance, they fled profusely, and being helped to the shore by their companions, were conveyed on board—finishing in this mournful manner what was commenced as the frolic and recreation of a morning.—*Halifax Recorder*, May 13.

**NEWFOUNDLAND.**—Thursday the 21st May, having been appointed by the Rev. Dr. Scallan, to be observed by the Roman Catholic inhabitants of St. John's, as a day of Thanksgiving for the blessings conferred on their brethren in Ireland, by the passing of the Relief Bill into a Law, the Benevolent Irish Society and Mechanics Society walked in procession to the Catholic Chapel, where Divine Service was performed by the Rev. M. A. Fleming, who concluded a most excellent discourse by desiring his congregation to give, after the service, "Three cheers for our good King, three for the Duke of Wellington, three for Mr. Peel, and as many as their lungs would permit for Daniel O'Connell, Esq."—which was complied with to the strict letter. Public rejoicings took place at Harbor Grace and Carbonear in consequence of the passing of the Bill.—The Seal Fishery had proved very indifferent; upwards of twenty vessels had been lost, and a great many had arrived with bad trips.—Trade in general was in a depressed state.

About 130 Emigrants from Yorkshire, who arrived at this port from England a week ago, have set out for the state of Illinois, via Montreal. A number of them had agricultural implements and some money.—*Quebec Gaz.*

**BERMUDA.**—The Royal Gazette of May 12, says: "At the Court of Assize, on Thursday last, Kit Peron, a black man residing in Hamilton, was sworn to give evidence on an Indictment. This is the first instance in which a slave has been admitted to give evidence in any of our Courts of Justice, a privilege conferred on persons of that description by the late Act of 1827. Upon the witness being brought to the bar to be sworn, and his Certificate from the Vestry registered in Court, His Honor the Chief Justice charged him in a very impressive manner, upon the solemnity of the duty he was about to perform, and the obligation it imposed upon him, of adhering to the truth, and preserving that good character which had entitled him to this valuable privilege."

**BARBADOS, May 5.**—The country, we are sorry to say, wears parched and completely autumnal appearance—most of the plants are scorched or dried up; the ponds are all empty, and most of the wells are quite out; and to add to the fearful and desolating picture, we are credibly informed, there is a mortality among the Cattle, owing to the scarcity of food and water. If we are without rain much longer, the prospect of crop for the ensuing year will be destroyed, and we shall experience the greatest want and privation in every department of domestic life—there will indeed be no food for man or beast!

SAINT JOHN:  
TUESDAY, JUNE 23, 1829.

We have English dates, via United States, down to the 16th ult. We have the satisfaction of observing, that the riotous proceedings in some quarters, occasioned by the difficulties of the times, have been, for the present, repressed, though not altogether without bloodshed. It is to be feared, however, that there is something radically wrong, and that until some vital change takes place in our relative circumstances, no substantial or permanent amelioration can be expected. The stronger may keep down the weaker party by coercion and violence, but there will still be the lurking elements of repulsion, ever ready, when occasion offers, to manifest their existence by their baneful operation. The wounds may be skinned over, and, to a superficial observer, may present the appearance of perfect soundness, but soon they will again fester and discharge themselves in the most direful forms. To discover the adequate remedy, seems, as yet, to baffle the skill of our profoundest political economists. And sorry should we be to join issue with those speculators who consider a state of war as our only prosperous condition. Such a state we must ever regard as foreign and unnatural to the human heart, and therefore that country must be brought into circumstances peculiarly unfortunate, to whose prosperity it has become essential.

**MR. O'CONNELL.**—The case of this Gentleman was not finally disposed of at the date of our last advice. He had presented himself for the purpose of taking his seat in Parliament, but demurred at some of the oaths required of him under the old formula, and not being a member till he takes his seat, it was argued that he had no right to be heard on the subject of his case. The matter was soon to be set at rest, but from the state of parties and of reasoning, we are led to infer that a new election must take place in the County for which he was returned, and from the effect likely to be produced on the Clare electors by the operation of the Disfranchisement Bill, his re-election seems somewhat doubtful. He has recently manifested a very becoming spirit of respect for the laws of his country, and of acquiescence in the decision of the supreme Legislature.

**MARQUIS OF ANGLESEY.**—Several interesting documents have been produced in reference to the Noble Marquis's administration in Ireland, tending to throw light on the principles by which it was guided, and the grounds on which it was objected to by His Majesty's Government. He seems to have set out on principles of the greatest liberality, but these being premature in their exercise, tended, in the opinion of the DUKE OF WELLINGTON and MR. PEELE, to keep alive that spirit which His Grace required to be put down as a measure preparatory to Catholic Emancipation, which he seems to have had at heart for a considerable time previous to his writing the letter to Dr. CURTIS, of which so much has been said and written. It would have been fair to have made the good-hearted Marquis acquainted with the intentions of Ministers regarding Ireland, anterior to his appointment as its Vice-Roy, and much unpleasant feeling would thereby have been spared.

**RUSSIA AND TURKEY.**—If the latest advices from the theatre of war are to be implicitly relied on, success continues to attend the Russian arms.

**PORTUGAL.**—Report says that appearances in that wretched country, are now more favourable to the cause of legitimate government. But we have been often taught to put little confidence in the professions of a people who are mean spirited and shamefully debased to the last degree. Something may be hoped for from the interference of Great-Britain, but of that interference, we have, as yet, no decisive information.

**THE CIRCUIT COURT,** which was opened last Tuesday, has not yet terminated its sittings.

**NEW POST OFFICE.**—We are glad to announce that a Post Office has been established at the Portage, Magaguadavic, and that Mr. GIDSON KENTON has been appointed Post Master. The great necessity there existed for a public place of deposit for letters and papers at

Magaguadavic, has long been severely felt by all persons transacting business with the settlers on the banks of that extensive and important River.—*St. And. Herald*.

**CASUALTIES OF SHIPPING.**—Lloyd's List has been published upwards of a century.—Until about the year 1740, it was printed only twice a week; and a list of more than 11 British and 7 foreign ports, and a few paragraphs whereas the list of the present time has shipping intelligence from every quarter of the globe. The following is a list of the losses and accidents which have befallen British vessels, extracted from this valuable publication, during the year 1828:—

**ON FOREIGN VOYAGES.**—153 wrecked, 267 driven on shore, (225 of them known to have been got off, and probably others;) 1 steamer driven on shore, but got off; 36 sunk (3 of them raised;) 31 abandoned at sea; (6 afterwards carried into port, and 5 drifted on shore;) 12 missing, no doubt foundered; 12 condemned as unworthy; 5 burnt, 2 run down.

**TAKEN.**—16 by vessels under the Royal Navy, and 3 zilian, and Colombian colors, (2 of them taken, and given up;) 2 by Moroccan cruizers, for not being provided with a Mediterranean pass, but restored.

**PLUNDERED.**—7 by pirates, 6 by vessels under Buenos Ayres colors; 3 by Colombian cruizers; and 1 by Greeks.

**COASTERS AND COLIERS.**—84 wrecked, including one steamer; 267 driven on shore (172 of them known to have been got off, and probably others;) 3 steamers driven on shore, but got off; 1 do. caught fire and drifted on shore; 69 sunk, including a steamer, (9 of them raised;) 4 run down and sunk; 11 abandoned at sea, one afterwards carried into port, and 3 driven on shore; 3 burnt; 10 missing, supposed to have foundered.
