MORE COMMODITIES MAY

BE CONTROLLED BY THE

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT

Washington, Sept. 15.—Additional congressional legislation for government control of the prices of virtually all commodities for the period of the war is recommended in a referendum to ascertain business opinion on government price control, which was sent out by the chamber of commerce of the United States to business organizations through out the country.
