KAISER MAGNIFIES VALOR OF THE TURKS

Proud Honor to Come in Touch With Army That Fought At Gallipoli

Constantinople, Oct. 24.—Emperor William will here attend a banquet at the Palace of Dolmabahce. The guests included Sultan Mohammed V, all the Turkish princes and members of the cabinet, and Dr. Richard von Kühlmann, the German foreign secretary. Responding to the sultan's toast, the German emperor said:

"Yesterday it was my privilege to stand on ground where Turkish forces by land and sea performed immortal, glorious deeds, victoriously frustrating the enemy's assault on the heart of the empire and rendering immense service to our common cause.

"Anafarta, Ari Burnu and Sedd-ül-Bahr will ever remain glorious pages in Turkish history. It is a proud honor for me to come in personal touch with such an army through my appointment as field marshal.

"I gather from Your Majesty's words that the Turkish army and people have the same resolute confidence as have the German army and people to continue the war to a happy conclusion which will assure the rights and interests of our empires. In unshakable loyalty the Germans and Turks will persevere shoulder to shoulder with the Austrians, Hungarians and Bulgarians until our enemies recognize the uselessness of their continuance of the war. In peace time our peoples will be welded still more firmly on peaceful work kultur."

NO READJUSTMENT OF LIQUOR FINES YET

Some time ago Mayor Hayes wrote to Premier Foster pointing out to him that under the present prohibition act St. John city receives no portion of the liquor fines collected here, whereas under the former conditions, two-thirds of the collections went into the city coffers. So revision was suggested. At a subsequent meeting of the municipal council an order was passed for a copy of the premier's reply, and the following was brought down:

St. John, N. B., October 10, 1917.

Dear Mr. Mayor:

I duly received your letter of the 1st instant, directing my attention to the fact that under the prohibition act the city of St. John is not receiving any portion of the fines collected in comparison with the two-thirds paid to them under the old liquor license laws. You further suggest in your letter that a change might be brought about and a portion of these fines paid to the city, by order-in-council.

In reply I would say that I discussed this matter with the other members of the government, but I find that any change in this way would necessitate an amendment to the act. Further, the government would not care to pledge itself to any action along the line of a division of these fines until the act has been in force for a sufficient time to allow of our being able to determine the probable amount that will be required to properly and efficiently enforce it.

I beg to further point out to you that elections are pending in other countries, the result of which will be to further increase the cost of administration of the act, and I think that it is only fair that a reasonable time should be allowed before a definite conclusion is arrived at.

Personally I have every sympathy with your contention, realizing that the work and sympathy of the police force in this city are necessary to the proper enforcement of the act.

WAR CERTIFICATES ON INSTALMENT PLAN

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Great strides have been made in the sale of war saving certificates by the national service board, which now has charge of this work throughout the dominion. During the first few weeks of the operation, the National Service board, twenty-seven large industrial establishments in Toronto district were canvassed and 65,000 men and women were induced to purchase war saving certificates to the amount of \$195,000.

This was in the nature of an experiment, with a view of working out a plan of operation in industrial establishments whereby war savings certificates could be purchased by employees on the instalment plan. This has been successful that it is now planned to have a dominion-wide organization, with the double object of raising money for war purposes and the promotion of thrift.

The National Service organization is to be turned over to the victory loan campaign also. This decision was reached at a meeting in Toronto, at which C. W. Peterson, secretary of the National Service Board, consulted with the Dominion Loan Committee, with the object of coordinating the efforts of the National Service organization and the work of the Victory Loan Committee.
