SAYS CARRIGAN WILL AGAIN MANAGE RED SOX

J. Ed. Grillo, sporting editor of the Washington Star, says Bill Carrigan has accepted the management of the Red Sox. Mr. Grillo writes as follows: "Bill Carrigan, who has been most emphatic in his announcement that he had quit baseball for all time to come, seems to have changed his mind, for he has notified Messrs. Frazee and Ward that he will accept their proposition to again manage the Red Sox at a salary of \$20,000 a year."

That the new owners of the Boston American league club will jump at this proposition, there is not the slightest doubt. They have been worrying because they did not believe Carrigan would change his mind. They realized their chances of winning another pennant in 1917 would be better with him in charge of the team than any other available manager.

Carrigan, in turning his mind, has displayed good judgment. Despite his interests in a banking institution, there is no sense in overlooking an opportunity to toss off \$20,000 a year.

This is a lot more money than his interest in the bank would yield him, and, after all, is made without much physical or mental exertion. He has simply to go along with the same team which won so easily last season, is likely to land another pennant, and get an additional \$4,000 or so as a result.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—Hugh Ward, who with Harry Frazee, has purchased the Boston American baseball team, and will come into formal possession on Dec. 14, is planning to give Europe some major league baseball when the war ends.

"My plan is to send two baseball teams over as soon as the league season here closes," Mr. Ward said. "As for the expenses, it will cost less than to send a team from New York to San

MAY HAVE TO FACE A SERIOUS CHARGE

Two Former Employees of Nova Scotia Hospital Arrested

(Halifax Chronicle.)

There was an occurrence at the Nova Scotia Hospital a few days ago which may have fatal results and as a consequence two former employees of the institution are under arrest, charged at present with causing grievous bodily harm. On Sunday last the hospital authorities found a patient had been assaulted and kicked, it being alleged that he threw something at two keepers. The injuries of the patient were not then adjudged to be especially serious and two keepers, Urban Martel, who belongs to Cape Breton, and Veldener Blachutta, a German or Austrian, who had been on parole and reporting to the authorities at regular intervals, were discharged. They had been in the employ about twelve months.

The patient's stomach had been lacerated and torn, by a kick, he reported, and his condition gradually grew worse and Dr. Lawlor summoned an outside medical man for consultation. On Thursday his condition became so serious that the matter was reported to the authorities and Deputy Sheriff Seriven and Mitchell went on a hunt for the two discharged keepers to place them under arrest, pending arrangements.

On Thursday night Martel was located in a boarding house in the city and Friday Blachutta was also located, the pair being arraigned before Stipendiary McLeod on Friday afternoon and remanded until Monday. Bail is being applied for.

On Saturday morning the patient was reported in a precarious condition.

WILL RETURN TO FRONT Charlotte Town, Guardian—Lieut. Colonel Right Rev. Monsignor Burke, chief of the Catholic chaplains of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, arrived in Charlotte Town yesterday after a visit to Tignish and Alberton and will leave this morning for Ottawa. When along the Somme front he met at Courcellette Major Jenkins of this city. Traveling as he did from camp to camp he had an opportunity of seeing quite a number of island soldiers. He spoke of meeting Col. Ing and the men of the 108th when they were at Caesar's Camp, Shorncliffe. Mr. Burke has now under his charge fifty-five Catholic chaplains. The total number of chaplains, of all denominations, with the Canadian forces is 250.
