CANADIANS OCCUPY EX-GERMAN TRENCHES

Have Brick Floors; Graves of Fallen Grenadiers Kept Neat, With Flowers

London, June 22.—Lieut. Douglas Hall, Royal Air Service, belonging to Toronto, now lying in a hospital at Alexandria, wounded in the face and arms from shrapnel, is progressing favorably. He was previously in the hospital with fever after six days and nights of continuous fighting.

News received here today says a great portion of the Canadians are now occupying trenches recently in the possession of Germans. They are eight feet deep, with a brick floor, but only about two and a half feet wide. These trenches bear eloquent testimony to the manner in which the Germans spent the time in fortifying themselves during the winter. Close by is a graveyard marking the spot where the Prussians and the Grenadiers had a hand-to-hand fight. It is fenced off with wire and boards and bears the inscription: "In memory of those who fell here, it is the duty of those who follow to attend to the flowers and weeds."

As a result each regiment has planted a different variety of flowers, which are kept clean and watered each day.

Near here, also, Sergt. O'Leary, ex-Royal North West Mounted Policeman, won his V. C. so the Canadians just now are on historic ground.

URGES DEVELOPMENT OF MERCHANT MARINE

Necessity Emphasized in Interview Here With H. H. Blanchet

Former Member of Vancouver Board of Trade—Opportunities For Expansion of Business if There is Available Shipping

A visitor to the city during the last few days has been H. H. Blanchet, representing the Canada Metal Co., Ltd., of Toronto. In the course of a conversation in the nature of an interview yesterday with a Times reporter, Mr. Blanchet emphasized the necessity of the development of the shipbuilding industry and a merchant marine in this country.

It is one of our greatest needs if we wish to prosper," he said, "and the federal government should awaken to the fact."

Mr. Blanchet is a retired member of the board of trade of Vancouver, and during the while he was more conversant with conditions in the west in this connection, from what he had observed he thought they would apply equally well in the east. He is to leave this week for Newfoundland. Mr. Blanchet said: "We have in British Columbia 220 saw mills and fifty-nine shingle mills, and in 1910 the output was 1,940,000,000 feet. It is sold before leaving Vancouver that there was enough business in sight to keep all these plants going full blast for the next five years. The first question we have to contend with is that we have no ships to carry this lumber to Europe, where the cities are being destroyed by the war. The time was never more opportune than the present to interest British shipbuilding firms to have branch plants on both the eastern and western coasts of Canada.

"No nation has any better government than the country deserves. We have not to go very far, only to our neighbors to the south to see the disastrous disorganization of trade at the present time owing to the fact that the United States has never had a merchant marine. Canada of necessity is an agricultural country. The western prairies have hardly been scratched. What we are raising now in cereal crops is very small to what we shall do in the future, and we must have a merchant marine to bring these cereals both by the western route by the Panama Canal and by the St. Lawrence and St. John.

"If the people of Canada do not go in for this in a serious way, we will always be handicapped and depending on foreign owned bottoms for our export trade. Canada is the greatest exporting country in the world, when you take into consideration her small population. Before leaving Vancouver I was shown letters from England in which it was said that English firms were willing to place orders in this country for 1,000,000 of box shooks, and the orders could not be accepted because it was impossible to get ships.

"This particular line has been made in Norway and Sweden and has advanced fifty per cent owing to Germany having made wood contraband of war. In the maritime provinces I am told that the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. can compete in India and other countries on steel rails, and I understand the reason

GERMAN RAILWAY TO BAGDAD PROCEEDS

War Has Not Stopped Work on Cause of So Much "Diplomacy"

Constantinople, via London, June 22.—The war has not interrupted the work on the Bagdad Railroad, which when it is completed, is to run from Konia by way of Anama, Mosul and Bagdad to Bussra. The bridge over the Euphrates River having recently been finished, another important link in the line was made today with the final blast in the Bastunne Tunnel, running through the Amanus Mountains and connecting the Plain of Cicilia with Aleppo. This tunnel is three miles long and has been four years in building.

of this is that they get their ore from Newfoundland from the seaboard, it being very cheaply handled, and the coal is mined on the seaboard also, so that it is mostly a question of labor to contend with. Immensely increased business could be done in these and other lines, so soon as the war is over and the time to get ready for this is the present."

It is reported from Washington that more than a score of American firms are establishing new color works or enlarging the output of existing plants to meet the demand of the textile industries and other allied branches of manufacture for dyes.

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
