Regan, secretary-treasurer of that body who, accompanied by Mrs. Regan, arrived in the city yesterday.

Colonel Regan said last night that he had been in conference with L. W. Simms, president of the Saint John Board of Trade, Colonel A. E. Massie, George E. Barbour, Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster and A. P. Paterson yesterday afternoon. They will attend to local arrangements, Colonel Regan said.

Colonel Regan said the convention would bring between 150 and 200 outstanding men to Saint John. His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor W. F. Todd, has consented to act as chairman at the opening session on the morning of Oct. 1. The Prime Minis. man at the opening session on the morning of Oct. 1. The Prime Minister of Canada and the leader of the Opposition, or their representatives, will be in attendance to represent their respective political parties, Colonel Regan said.


