PREPARING FOR CANADIAN TRADE BOARD MEETING

Col. Regan, Secretary-Treasurer, Confers With Representatives in City

To make preliminary arrangements for the first annual meeting of the Canadian Board of Trade, to be held in Saint John on Oct. 19, 20 and 21, a convention which promises to bring to the city outstanding business, political and railway spheres of the Dominion, is the purpose of the visit of Colonel James L. Regan, secretary-treasurer of that body who, accompanied by Mrs. Regan, arrived in the city yesterday.

Colonel Regan said last night that he had been in conference with L. W. Simms, president of the Saint John Board of Trade, Colonel A. E. Massie, George E. Barbour, Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster and A. P. Patterson yesterday afternoon. They will attend to local arrangements, Colonel Regan said.

Colonel Regan said the convention would bring between 150 and 200 outstanding men to Saint John. His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor W. F. Todd, has consented to act as chairman at the opening session on the morning of Oct. 1. The Prime Minister of Canada and the leader of the Opposition, or their representatives, will be in attendance to represent their respective political parties, Colonel Regan said.

TO ADDRESS CONVENTION

E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National lines, will address the convention, Colonel Regan announced. Many prominent members of the Dominion government will also be present and will act in an advisory capacity to the committee in matters affecting their various departments, he said.

The delegates will be welcomed to the city by L. P. Simms, Premier Baxter and Mayor White. Colonel Regan said. While no definite program has been prepared as yet, this will be done shortly.

All three days are to be devoted to committee work on the larger questions of importance to the country at this time, including cost of government, immigration, taxation, problems of the western, eastern and central provinces, preservation of the identity of Canadian grain, industrial research, trade and commerce, export and domestic, and particular attention is to be given to some systems of facilitating inter-provincial trade.

SPEAKS OF SESSIONS

Colonel Regan said last night that the meetings would be of a rather different character from the usual meetings of associations. There are to be few speeches, none of them lengthy, and practically all of them are to be delivered at the luncheons or dinners of the convention.

In conjunction with the annual meeting of the new Dominion organization of boards of trade, a tour has been arranged for the delegates which includes visits to Sherbrooke, Que., Annapolis Valley, Halifax, Amherst, Moncton, Quebec and Montreal. At Montreal the delegates will be present at the opening of the new office of the Canadian Board of Trade, a meeting of representative business men from different parts of Canada. An executive council was then appointed to carry on the organization until the first annual meeting. Organization meetings have been held from time to time, and in May last executive offices were opened at Ottawa. Colonel Regan has been acting as secretary-treasurer.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee which has been carrying on the Canadian Board of Trade is as follows: I. H. Bowman, Regina; A. O. Dawson, Montreal; M. Dellar, Vancouver; John P. Gordon, Charlottetown; S. B. Gundy, Toronto; F. E. Osborne, Calgary; R. G. Persse, Winnipeg; L. W. Simms, Saint John; D. R. Turnbull, Halifax. Colonel and Mrs. Regan will leave for Nova Scotia this morning on the steamer Empress. While in Saint John they were guests at the Admiral Beatty.

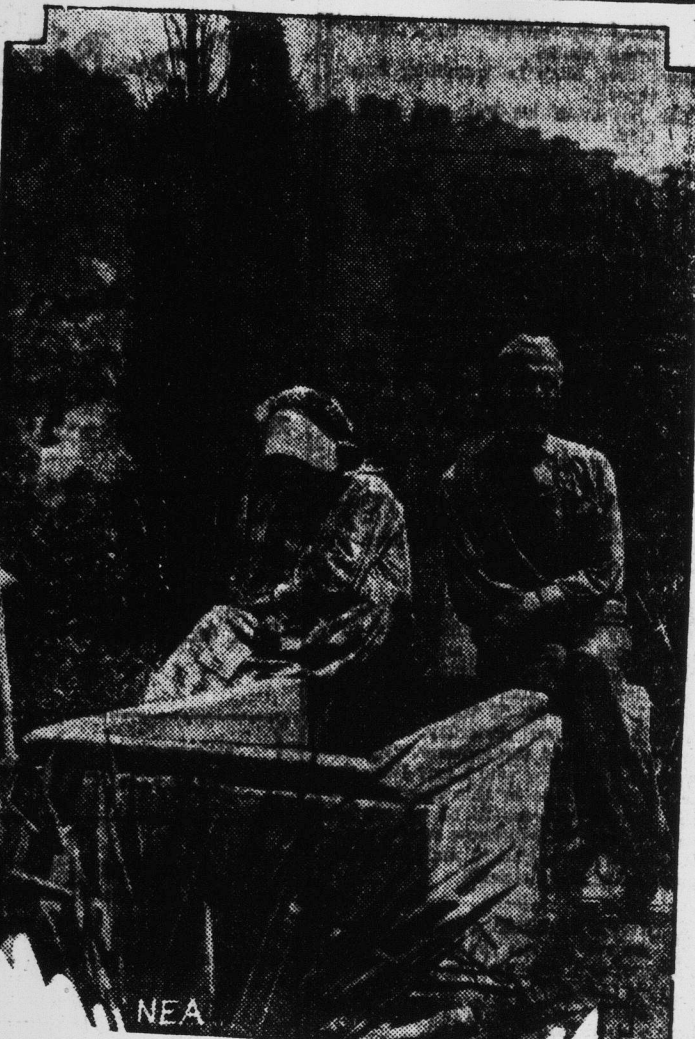
MISSION FACT REACHED

TRAINING SCHOOL TO BE HELD IN CITY

Program of Study For C. G. I. T. Group Leaders Arranged

A standard school for training leaders of the Canadian Girls in Training groups is to be held in Saint John from Sept. 27 to Oct. 1 with sessions each night from 7.30 to 9.30 o'clock. The school will be conducted in the rooms of Centenary United church and it is believed, by those in charge, that the holding of the course so early in the season will enable every church in the city to secure trained leadership for launching C. G. I. T. work this year.

The holding of this school was decided upon last spring by the leaders council and Miss Marjorie Trotter, Maritime girls' work secretary, is receiving the entire week for taking charge of the school. She has also arranged to be at the Maritime Religious Education Council rooms each day of that week in order that any one who is interested in the C. G. I. T. work may consult with her on any problems in connection with it.

A comprehensive and very practical program has been prepared for the school sessions and it is expected that it will have one of the largest enrollments of any leaders training course yet held in Saint John.
